Health Institute Deans Scouts Critics' Claims It By The Pint Injures Most People No More Than Potatoes

Dr. Hill supports his advocacy of coffee as a reasonably harmless beverage by quoting Dr. Prescott, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, a personal friend of the public health department, who declares that coffee is a "paragon of the human race instead of being, as some charge, one of its great evils."

DESTROYS GARAGE WITH FORTY CARS

Fifteen New Automobiles Are Lost in \$75,000 Show-room Blaze.

OTHER FIRMS SUFFER

St. Thomas, April 29.—Damage estimated at \$75,000 was done tonight by fire, which swept the mechanical department of the auto sales and service rooms of James A. Mulligan on Meridiam street. Over 40 automobiles, 15 of them new, were destroyed.

Mrs. Pierce and Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Purcell, who occupied the flats above the showrooms, escaped in safety, but will suffer some loss to their property through smoke and water. When Mr. and Mrs. Purcell, who are well advanced in years, emerged from the smoke-filled hall and stairway, they carried their most cherished possession, a pair of canaries in their cages.

Building Burned Rapidly

When the fire was discovered by Mrs. Pierce the whole rear of the lower portion of the building was a roaring furnace, and the smoke had filled the whole second floor of that section. The structure was quickly soaked and burned rapidly. When the flames broke through the roof of the section in which used cars were stored the reflection attracted people from all parts of the city. Four streams of water were used by Chief Mitrella and his men, and thousands of gallons of water poured into the burning structure, but the flames could not be checked before the building was gutted.

While the fire was at its height the front of the showrooms were broken open and a number of display cars were salvaged. A large gasoline storage tank in front of the building was given special protection and an explosion averted.

The Elgin Auto Electric Company, who occupied the extremity of the wing on the right, suffered less damage, but some loss through smoke and water.

Caused by Short Circuit

The fire is believed to have originated from a short circuit in one of the autos stored in the building. Among the lost autos is a new service truck recently added to the equipment of the garage, and two tractors.

Chief Mitrella put into service 1,200 feet of new hose delivered to the department about a week ago, and after the fire declared that this additional equipment proved of marked value in this particular case.

Cliff Kitchin, a member of the fire department, suffered cuts about the eye which required medical attention.

The building was of brick veneer construction, and is owned by A. E. McNabb, who lives in the States.

Following the fire, Mr. Purcell treated the firemen to a meal at the White Palace cafe.

Paris-New York Flyers Prepare

Paris, April 29.—The long proposed flight from Paris to New York will be attempted about July 20, it was announced today by Paul Taranon and Frances Coll, both distinguished aviators.

The flyers will attempt to win the \$25,000 prize offered in 1919 by Raymond Orteff for the first flight from Paris to New York and return. They plan to fly via England, Ireland, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, in a hydro-aeroplane, which is being built with a 500-horsepower motor made in France under German patents.

Ferguson Declines Invitation To Lay St. Thomas Cornerstone

SNOWDEN ATTACKS CHURCHILL BUDGET

Declares Taxation Relief Goes Solely To Wealthy Classes.

London, April 29.—Spokesman of the Liberal and Labor parties launched an attack on Winston Churchill's budget when the House of Commons reassembled today. Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchequer in the Labor government, and who turned the public purse strings over to Mr. Churchill when the Conservatives returned to power, declared that it was "the worst rich man's budget ever introduced."

Sir Alfred Mond, who has held numerous prominent offices in previous governments, doubted the wisdom of the country's return to the gold standard, saying it would tie the British monetary system to that of the United States and make the London bank rate more subservient to Wall street than it had been in the past "in order to obtain a purely sentimental result."

Both Liberals and Laborites objected to the reimposition of the McKenna duties and imperial tariffs, while the Conservatives, who spoke on the subject, thanked Mr. Churchill for reviving them.

SWEET CLOVER KILLS COWS IN DORCHESTER

Deaths Are Due To Fungus Growth On Clover Stocks.

Ingersoll, April 29.—In the Dorchester district several deaths among dairy cattle have occurred recently from the effects of eating sweet clover. Recently Charles Mitchell, whose farm is near the village, lost five animals, while Malcolm McVicar, ex-M.L.A., also had four animals die from the same cause.

The deaths, it is stated, were due to a fungus development in the stocks of the sweet clover, according to Dr. Gill, veterinary, of Dorchester village. The fibrin of the blood is destroyed by the fungus, and under excitement or from a bruise the animals frequently bleed to death.
