The quantity, however, is not up to other seasons, the shortage being estimated at at least one third, and no doubt more than that figure in many cases. The cereals are later than could be desired, owing to the wet spring in this part of the province. At present the crop looks in good condition, though the yield will be considerably short, though the yield will be considerably short, owing to dry spells succeeding the wet springs. The fruit yield is much lighter than that of last year, but the quality and general appearance is fair, and doubtless the fruit will be much larger than when the trees are overloaded, as they were last year. The root crep received several much needed showers recently, which will have the effect to bring it up to the general average.
