ENTY PERISH IN S. S. WRECK

Montreal, Nov. 2 — Twenty lives lost when the steamer Cecilia L. was wrecked last night in Lake St. Lawrence. The River boat was plying between Valleyfield and Montreal when on her way there last evening she was caught in the gale, which swept this district between five and six o'clock. With the wind screaming, the little boat could make headway against the power of the waves. Her captain tried to run ashore but before the boat could be manoeuvred to land, she was swung by the wind and her overboard.

There were twenty-four people on the boat, and of that number are known to be saved, he rushed ashore on the island. It was impossible to man a boat in the face of the wind; in fact, there was no time for that, the boat coming with such appalling velocity.

RURAL DEANERY MEET IN DALHOUSIE

Interesting Sessions Held at St. Mary's Church—Dedication of new Tower.

A very interesting and profitable meeting of the clergy of the Rural Deanery of Chatham was held in Dalhousie on the 22nd and 23rd inst. There were present the Ven. Archdeacon Forsyth, Rev. W. J. Bates, Rev. R. J. Coleman, Rev. L. A. Foyster, and Rev. J. E. Purdie. There were celebrations of the Holy Communion on each morning at 8 o'clock, and the chapter meetings of the clergy began at 10 a. m. at the rectory on each day. The public services in St. Mary's Church on each evening at 7.30 o'clock were largely attended and very interesting and appropriate. The first of these services was in connection with the dedication of the new tower, which has just been erected at the west end of St. Mary's church. In this tower a new bell has been placed, and these improvements, together with a new furnace, organ, and carpet for the chancel, have added very greatly to the fitness of the church for its sacred uses. Great credit is due to the Messrs. Hilyard Bros., for their energy and liberality in furthering and completing these improvements which will cost more than \$1000.

Before the regular service of evening song on the 22nd inst., the Archdeacon said suitable prayers of dedication in the tower porch, after which the clergy proceeded to the chancel while the first hymn was being sung. The Archdeacon preached from the text, "Walk about Zion, Go round about her, and tell the towers thereof." His historical account of the career of the church in Dalhousie was listened to with great attention by the large congregation. After this service a very pleasant social reunion of the clergy and parishioners was held in St. Mary's hall. After the enjoyment of conversation and refreshments, the Archdeacon and clergy spoke words of appreciation of the kind hospitalities they had enjoyed, and of congratulation to the parishioners of Dalhousie on the improvements in St. Mary's Church.

On the following evening the usual Deanery Chapter service was held, and a large congregation was again in attendance. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. W. J. Bates, formerly rector of Dalhousie and his timely counsels and words of encouragement were much appreciated. On the afternoon of the 23rd, through the kindness of the Messrs. Hilyard Bros., the clergy were taken by steamer to Campbellton and back, giving them an opportunity of seeing the new church now being erected there and of spending a few moments at the rectory. On the morning of the 24th the clergy returned to their several homes, after an interesting and profitable reunion.

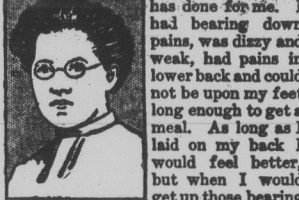

CURFEW SOUNDS FROM OLD TOWER

Historic Bell That Heroic Girl Silenced to Save Lover's Life.

London, Nov. 6.—Curfew will be rung every night from now until March next on the historic old bell of Chertsey Abbey to whose clapper Blanch: Heriot is supposed to have clung, 500 years ago, in the hope of saving her lover's life, as told in the famous poem by Rose Hartwick Thorpe.

Probably few of the thousands of people who have read "Curfew Shall Not Ring Tonight," or heard it recited, have any idea that the bell which its plucky heroine—who is called Bessie in the poem—kept from ringing still is in existence. On the other hand those who have visited Chertsey, which is a thriving town twenty five miles from London will have learned all about the Abbey Bell, as it is called, considered to be the most historic and oldest ringing bell in England.

It was more than 600 years ago, or in 1310, to be exact. It weighs ten hundred weight, measures three feet high and nine feet in circumference and around the crown, in raised Lombardic capitals, is a Latin text which may be translated, "Of your charity pray for us, O Virgin Mary."

It was ordered to be cast by John de Rutherwyck, the most famous of the abbots of Chertsey, and in May, 1471, it tolled the death of the murdered King Henry VI; when his corpse was brought from London by water and found a shelter in Chertsey Abbey until it finally was reburied in St. George's Chapel, Windsor.

Seventy years later, during the reign of Edward VI., the First Book of Common Prayer was compiled in Chertsey Abbey, and no doubt the historic bell then tolled to call together the men who were engaged on a work that, with alterations, is used today in the Established Church through the British Empire.

In the abbey it is supposed to have been used as the Pardon Bell, which, previous to the reformation was tolled to call the worshippers to a prayer to the Virgin Mary which preceded the regular service. When the abbey was dismantled, however, its bell was transferred to the "gloomy, shadowed tower," of the parish church of Chertsey, which is named St Peter's and also dates back to John de Rutherwyck, and there, "every evening, just at sunset," it "tolled the twilight hour."

every evening, that is, except the historic one during the War of the Roses, when Blanch Heriot "sprang within the old church door," "mounted up the gloomy tower," and kept the bell from ringing what would have been "fair young Basil's funeral knell."

His name, by the way, was neither Basil nor Underwood, it was Nevill, and he was a nephew of Warwick the King Maker, nor had Cromwell anything to do with the episode, which happened a couple of centuries before the future Protector was born. Why the authoress, who, it seems, is still living in California, transferred the incident from the earlier period to the later, that venerable lady alone knows. She is now sixty-two, and among her treasures is a porcelain replica of the famous bell which was sent to her from Chertsey.

This old abbey or curfew bell now forms the fifth one of a peal of eight in the belfry of Chertsey Parish church. After hundreds of years, the ringing of the curfew was abandoned at Chertsey, but it was revived by the present vicar, and now is carried out from October 1 to March 25.
