**McLAUGHLIN CARS WON HON-
ORS IN RELIABILITY TEST**

Had First Four in Ontario Tour, with
Goodyear Tires

The reliability tour from the Cana-
dian capital into the State of New
York, which took place in June excited
a great deal of interest all along the
route. It not only gave motorists a
chance to sample the terrible roads be-
tween Ottawa and Prescott, which was
the first leg of the journey, and where
conditions were made worse than or-
dinary by a heavy rainfall of eighteen
hours directly before the start, follow-
ing on several weeks of more or less
continuous rain, but it also enabled an
impetus to be given to the Good Roads
movement in Ontario, as well as per-
mitted of the celebration of the ex-
change of licenses between Ontario
and New York State by a large body
of motorists.

As to the reliability tour itself the
McLaughlin cars carried off the first
four prizes, and the contest must be
regarded as a triumph for them and
their drivers, as well as for the Good-
year tires with which they were equi-
pped. The winner was G. B. McKay,
who finished the run to Gouverneur
with a perfect score of a thousand
points, this car not even losing a point
on the secret schedule run, which put
paid to the aspirations of so many of
the drivers. The fifth prize went to a
Dodge car, and the sixth to an Over-
land; while the McLaughlin cars were
the next three in order of finish on
points, followed by a Russell, Ford,
Chevrolet, and Buick.

The first prize was a silver shield
presented by the Ottawa Free Press,
who organized and managed the tour
with an executive board representing
the Ottawa Valley Motor Car Associa-
tion and the Ottawa Motor Club. G.
B. McKay also won ten golden soun-
dorns presented by C. H. Carlisle of the
Goodyear Tire Company of Canada,
and the silver cup presented by the
McLaughlin Motor Co. E. E. Code won
the silver cup given by the Mayor of
Ogdensburg and the cup of the Mc-
Laughlin Co. for the second entry,
and F. Wilson the silver cup given by
Mayor Porter of Ottawa and the Mc-
Laughlin cup for their third entry.
Sam Rensenthal won the silver cup of
the Overland Company for their best
entry and J. W. Jette the Ford prize.

Penalties were comparatively few
for even on the bad roads between Ot-
tawa and Prescott which called forth
all the skill of each individual driver,
there were few points lost and all fin-
ished with good high marks.

FEW ACCIDENTS.

Tire trouble and skidding caused the
greater part of the woes and worries
of the contestants and even of these
minor troubles there were very few.
The first lap of the road, from Ottawa
to Prescott, was enough to make even
the bravest driver quail, but all who
started went through in fine style.

It was the first reliability tour to en-
ter the United States from Eastern
Canada and the first organized party
of tourists to enter New York State
since the arrangement for the inter-
change of automobile licenses went in-
to effect.

Plans have already been made to
conduct the contest in 1917 by way of
Ogdensburg, Canton, Gouverneur,
Watertown and Alexandria Bay. The
finish will be at Ottawa. Motor boats
for the entire party have been promi-
sed for a day among the Thousand Is-
lands of Alexandria Bay.—Adv. 1 wk.

**BLACK CAPES
OBITUARY**

The Angel of Death has again visit-
ed our neighborhood and taken one of
our most respected residents in the
person of John Campbell, after a ling-
ering and painful illness which he bore
with Christian fortitude and patience.

The late Mr. Campbell was born in
Black Capes nearly fifty-five years
ago. About six years ago, he began
to complain of a pain in the arm, which
later developed into tuberculosis in the
shoulder. He went to the Royal Vic-
toria Hospital, Montreal, and was op-
erated on. This checked the disease
for a time; but in spite of all that
medical skill and the constant atten-
tion of a devoted wife and kind friends
could do, he died on the 21st inst.

He is survived by a wife, one son
and two daughters all at home, two
brothers, Donald and Neil of Black
Capes, four sisters, Mrs. J. W. Camp-
bell of Black Capes; Mrs. William Mc-
Colm and Mrs. George Montgomery of
New Richmond Centre and Miss Rose
of Red Bank, N. B.

Notwithstanding the inclemency of
the weather the funeral was largely
attended, showing the esteem in which
he was held. An eloquent, earnest and
very impressive funeral service was
conducted by the Rev. E. J. Rattee.
The interment was in St. Andrew's
Church Cemetery, New Richmond.

**LANCER CORPORAL
THOMAS JOHN BLAMPIED
of New Carlisle, N. B.**

In these sad days when every news-
paper contains a new list of those who
have made the last great sacrifice,
there are many whose memory will
ever live in loving hearts, but whose
deeds will be unrecorded. Their names
and their deeds are written in Heaven.
At the same time there are some whose
names deserve to receive special hon-
our upon earth. Such was Thomas
John Blamied of New Carlisle.

Born in Trinity, in the Island of
Jersey in 1894, he came as a lad of
fifteen to New Carlisle, and for five
years worked as an article clerk in
that place, winning not only the con-
fidence of his employer, but also the
love and esteem of all who knew him.

It can be truly said of him that he
combined in his character, modesty,
gentleness and sweetness of temper
with the highest and truest manhood.

Naturally full of life and gaiety, he
possessed a deep seriousness of pur-
pose which kept ever true to the high-
est.

He loved and followed the things that



are true and pure and lovely and of
good report, but he was always ready,
in the spirit of the Master, whom he
loved and served, to strive to win those
who were wandering into danger and
to lead them back to safety.

He was an ardent Temperance work-
er, taking a leading part in the work
of New Carlisle Lodge, No. 74, I. O.
G. T., in which he held several im-
portant offices. He was a loyal mem-
ber of the Church of England and a
faithful and devoted Sunday School
Teacher and Church worker.

His influence for good was all the
more effective because of his unassum-
ing character and he was a lion in
courage when called upon to bear wit-
ness to the Truth.

From the outbreak of the war his
heart was at the front and, as soon as
he was able, he enlisted for active
service, joining the 26th Battalion. He
was instrumental in the formation of
an I. O. G. T. Lodge among its mem-
bers and in making this Lodge a help-
ful influence in the life of the Batta-
lion.

From his letters from the front we
know that he never wavered in his det-
ermination to serve his country to the
limit of his power. He was killed by a
shell on June 12th, 1916 and buried by
his fellow soldiers from New Carlisle
on the field of battle. So died a true
servant of Jesus Christ, one of God's
finest gentlemen, a knight "sans peur
at some reproach," a friend whose
love was closer than a brother.

He has fought a good fight; he has
finished his course; he has kept the
faith. He awaits his crown and, in that
crown, we dare to believe, will shine
the love of many who have been helped
by his influence and example to higher
and holier things.
