GUILTY OR NOT GUILTY.

TRIAL OF THE AVENGER O'DONNELL AT THE OLD BILEY.

Evidence for the Prosecution—The Bearing of the Prisoner—Some Rather Damaging Testimony—A Defective Plan.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—The trial of O'Donnell, the avenger of Carey, began this morning before Mr. Justice Denham at the Old Biley.

Several ladies were among the large audience that crowded the place. No person was admitted without a ticket.

Chas. Russell, M. P., A. M. Sullivan, Solicitor-General, and Gen. Roger A. Pryor were present on behalf of the prisoner.

Sir Henry James, the attorney-general, and Messrs. Polard and Wright appeared for the government.

O'Donnell seemed unconcerned, and stood upright and calm throughout the proceedings.

After the charge was read O'Donnell took a seat and whispered to Gay a few moments.

The jury is a very intelligent one, being composed of men of middle and mature age.

There was an excitement outside of the court house. A large police force guarded the court.

Russell of O'Donnell's conduct demanded that witnesses should be excluded from the court room.

The request was granted. Upon the jury being called, the clerk asked O'Donnell if he had any objections to any of them.

O'Donnell replied, "I trust to my solicitor for that." While the jury was being completed O'Donnell seemed amused, and exchanged glances with Pryor.

None of the jurymen were challenged.

Henry James opened for the government. He described Carey's departure from England, his voyage to Capetown, and said there was no evidence to prove that the prisoner embarked on the steamer Kinfauns Castle to kill Carey.

But a new witness, Cubitt, would testify that at Capetown he gave the prisoner a letter which was addressed to the Melrose Castle, and the prisoner remarked on receiving it, "It'll shoot him."

The attorney-general presented the details of the murder and declared the act was not committed in self defence, but was willful, premeditated murder.

He enjoined the jury not to allow any feeling against Carey to influence their verdict.

O'Donnell listened closely to the address. He has been allowed the use of tobacco, which he chews frequently.

Parish, steward of the steamer Melrose Castle, repeated the evidence he gave at the preliminary examination.

Two plans of the cabin of the Melrose Castle were prepared by the prosecution and the other by the defence, which were shown to the witness, who declared the one offered by the prosecution was incorrect.

Mr. Justice Denham examined the latter plan and rejected it.

Mr. Russell cross-examined the witness. He asked O'Donnell if he was sitting down when he fired the shots at Carey.

O'Donnell answered that he was sitting down when he fired the shots at Carey, who stood leaning against the corner of the cabin two yards away.

Carry might have been shot by O'Donnell, but he made no gesture to size him. Witness saw no other pistol than O'Donnell's.

He did not see Carey go to his pocket for a pistol, but he saw that his father's pistol was found upon the boy.

DECLARED A NUISANCE BY PROVINCIAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

The provincial board of health met at the parliament buildings yesterday afternoon, the members present being Dr. Oldright, Dr. Chasby, Dr. Yeomans, Dr. Rae, Dr. Covertman and Dr. Bryce (secretary).

In the matter of school hygiene, the board came to the unanimous conclusion that the minimum of absolute air space to be provided for each child in this small space should be permitted only when there are such efficient means of ventilation and heating as will change the contained air in the room six times per hour, thus allowing 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour to each child, and further that such means as will change the air this number of times are the exception rather than the rule.

This resolution will be transmitted to the minister of education, along with a general report from the committee.
