A Bloody Battle at Arquin. CARRO, July 3.—An engagement has taken place at Arquin between a force of Egyptian troops under command of Col. Wodehouse and a body of dervishes. The dervishes were defeated and fied. Their loss was 500 killed or wounded. Seventy Egyptians were killed nded. Seventy Egyptians were killed aded. Two English officers were also

wounded. The dervishes attempted to effect a lodg-ment on the river bank. Col. Wodehouse immediately advanced and attacked them with a field force. The dervishes made a atublofn resistance, bat were fually forced to retire, fighting as they went. They were driven northward seven miles, but every foot of the ground was helly contested. Two guns belonging to the enemy were captured by the British. It is expected further fighting will occur abords.
