The Government of thi Hawaiian Islands has caught the natoonal borrowing fever. An attempt 10 float Hawaiian bonds for une-and-a-hall million dollars, has for the present, owing to trouble in the Islands, been fuund impossible, but it is thought that london money lenders will ultimately take the bonds at a slight discount.
late advices from South Amrica prove that the Spanish and Purtuguese republics have determined not to be behind their Nortlern neighbors in railway construction. English and A-nerican enpincers are in demand in Venezuela and Brazil, in which conntries the railway fever has become chronic. 'lelegruph lines are also being coustructed in Ecuador and Peru

The Governments of Brazil and the Argentine Republic havo apppointed commissioners to fix the bundary line between these c matries; but it is feared that the matter will not be anacably settled without a resort to arms. Might is still right, and man's judgment in international questions is hately affected by the connage of the guns, and the powder and shell in the magazines of the respective nationalities.

The late naval manacuvros on the Linglish coast were taken in sober earnest by the ignorant lower class of natives in Bombay. Tho rough translations of the English telegrams-" Capture of Falmouth, seizure of ironclads, capure of the mouth of the Thames," and so forth-set the community in the greatest state of excitement, and they firmly believed that England was actually in the hands of an enemy.

Ial Justice, of Quobec, seems to have a very imperfect idea of the proper sigdificance of its own name, having come out with a vicious article last Saturday coudemning a sentence passed by the Recorder of (euebec on one of the principal ruffianly zesailants of the Salvation Army there, and "prartically," says the Herall, "inciting to further bloodshed." The sentence is said to thave caused a bitter feeling in Frencla circles. So much for French justice and chivalry.

Germany displays but littic interest in the llulgarian probien, and perhaps this is not surprising. when we remember that the King of Holland is said to be dying, and that his successor to the throne is a little girl. If Prince Bis matk can but control the regency, the Dutch monarchy will scarce sarvive 2 decade, and the German federation will add as une of its states a country resowned for the commercial enterprise of us people. Such an acquisition would be of more value to Germany than two Hullands carved from the side of Russia.
W. S. Manning, Superintendent of the london Auxilliary of the Vegetarian Society, is prepared to send in all sending a stamped addressed wrapper a gratuitous packet of literature, including recipes for savory dishes, whole-meal bread, fresh fruit all the yenr round, nud catalogue of the Suciety's works. These may be of service to some of our subscribers, but Nown Scotians, with few exceptions, have no srtuples about indulging in flesh, fish, or fowl, and hence the vegetarian doctrines appear more theorelical than practical.

The tercentennial of the disemfoture of the Spanish Armada, is to be celebrated in Great liritain next jear. How strangely might the history of the past three centuries have been changed had the Spaniards effected a safe landing of their troops at that critical juncture. Three hundred years ago Spain was in the zenith of her power, and little did her people dream that the hardy Islanders of the North, commanded by such officers as Raleigh, Granville, Hawkins, Drake, Nelson atul nthers, would one day make liritain mistress of the sea.

Hetting is greatly on the increase in New lork, and the betters are cver on the lookout for new und original subjucts upon which to stake their money The color of the oyes, the light of a man's moustache, are frequently betted upon, but the latest idea is to ask whether the number upon a hank ante is odd or even, nnd if the interrogation be answered correctily, the biill is passed over to the lucky wimmer as unconcernedly as if it were a postage stamp The speculation fever, which finds its center in Wall Street, permeater Xew York society, and tends to the lnying of most ridiculous wagers.

Although many of the French railways are at present under the control of private companies, they will ultimately become the property of the National Government. In Sweden a movement is now on foot to purchase all the railways from private corporstions, and have them worked by the Government. We believe that in the interests of the public the Government should control and operate not unly the postal system of the country, but also the railway and iclegraph systems If these services wer: conducted by the Goverument, we should hear few complaints of grinding monopolies and excessive rates.

The little Spanish Republic of San Salvador is again in the throes of a rebellion, and Presidem Menender. has dechared himself the dictator of the State. According to a recent treaty Gautemala, Honduras and San Salvador, entered into an engagement t, aid each other in the suppression of loeal rebellions. but as tlet the former states are now engaged in political warfare, it is probable that San Salvador will have to settle her little family bronl at home. With a cammon origin and a common religion, it is surprising to observe the people of Central Americ. gathering themselves under five hostile flags instad of uniting umier one broad and liberal constitution.

There is said to be 240,000 words in the English language, and yet out vocabulary 15 so lumited that we cannot accurately define in words such sensations as pleasure and pain, nor give correct definitions of life and death. Most of us belicve we know whit pann and pleasure are, and what life is, but if called ipon to expres. our views, we would find it a somewhat difficult matter. An English inchange gives the following definition of patin, which may have been as clear as a bell to the wroter if he had a toothache at the time, but which, to our mind, leaves the question as to what is pain? in the same position in which he found it. Pain is a sensation which more or less rapidly and acutely assails the faculty of endurazce. In its commonest forms it is suffering produced by nerve excitation, the elements of $\cdot 1 . n$ nerveus apparatus being either directly or by a transmitted irtitation me. anically disturbed.

Volapuk, the new universal language, is making steady icadway. The Volapukists held their graud international congress a few days ago at Munich, and most of the countries of Europe sent representatives. The gond repute of America for enlightened curinsity was saved by one gentleman from Cincinnati. Pasteur Schicjer, tho inventor of the language, took the chair, in the name of the Associations of France 11: oxplamed that Volapuk was not meant to suppress other tongues, but only 10 supply $z$ new one for the common purposes of all mankind, and, in particular, for the promotion of universal brotherhond. The inventor hopes to induce the German Government to admit Volapuk to the list of languages transmissible by telegraph within the Empirc. In Denmark it has been officially recommended to telegraph clerks as a subject of study. The best augary for its spread in France lics in the fact that Berlin seems to take no interest in is, inasmuch as that city was not represented at the Congress. Englishmen ought to look upon Volapuk with a kindly eye, as mosi of its torrowings from the Germaric languages are taken from their own tongue. The characteristically English phrase, "How much money have you ?" must, we regret to say, be rendered in Volapuk by "Moni limiondil lalols." -Daily Netcs.
