

Russell case the Dominion Government was given the power to prohibit the sale of liquor, whereas in the Hodge case only the power to regulate the sale of liquor was given.—*Witness.*

It also contains what might be called an "Allegory of Life" from a temperance standpoint, under the headings, "The Boat" (Introduction) "The Chart," "The Deck," "Leaning Post," "The Beacon," "Drifting," "A Storm," "Shipwreck," "The Life Boat," and "Welcome Home," the whole forming a pamphlet of 20 pages and all furnished in paper covers for 4d stg., which ought to bring it within the reach of all. Doubtless in quantities to one address the price would be still lower. THE LICENSE ACT.

It has been decided to appeal the judgment of the Supreme Court in the Dominion License Act question to the Privy Council, and the Minister of Justice is preparing the necessary documents at once to be submitted.
