It is clear that the propeller " Ocean" same very near a lake catastrophe of a most startling character. But, thrilling as the narrative of the narrow escape of the boat is, what is to be said of the statement,-that "the women and children were placed in the first and the men in the second boats. The small boats had not been used for a long time and they were warped and leaky and frequently had to be baled out. Just after three members of the crew had pulled out from the wreck with the women, followed by the remainder of the passengere in the other boat, a thunderstorm came on. Had it not been that the water was shallow and calm at the place, it would have been impossible to avert a terrible disaster, as the shore along that point was very difficult of access." This is a clear violation of the Steamboat inspection act and one so glaring that it is to be hoped the matter will meet with immediate investigation.
