

THE CADIEUX AUDITORIUM

Next to the Robertson Conference Room, also entered from the Skelton Lobby, is the Cadieux Auditorium, named after Marcel Cadieux. This is a theatre-style facility seating 225 people, which offers as well full audio-visual and simultaneous interpretation facilities.

Mr. Cadieux joined the Department of External Affairs in 1941. After representing Canada in various missions abroad, he served in a number of senior positions before becoming Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs. He was the first Canadian to serve on the United Nations International Law Commission, and was both Ambassador to the United States and head of Canada's Mission to the European Community.

INFOTECH: LIBRARY AND ENQUIRIES SERVICE

Directly across from the entrance to Tower B on the south side of the Main Lobby is the InfoTech, which brings together the Jules Léger Library and the Enquiries Service.

The Léger Library, named after Jules Léger, the former diplomat and Governor General, houses Mr. Léger's generous donation of books and a unique collection of resources in the areas of foreign relations, international trade and international law. The Library is open to members of the Department, other government departments and agencies, the diplomatic corps, non-governmental organizations, business professionals, academics, and members of the general public conducting research on foreign affairs and international trade.


The Enquiries Service, also located in the InfoTech, responds to public enquiries and requests for DFAIT publications.
