FACILITIES FOR TRAINING PENITENTIARY STAFF

Question No. 2,640-Mr. Matheson:

- 1. What were the facilities for training penitentiary staff at the correctional staff college, Kingston, in 1960?
 - 2. What are the facilities now?
- Mr. D. S. Macdonald (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Justice): 1. In 1960, the correctional staff college at Kingston, Ontario, could provide accommodation for 24 officers. A total of 163 officers attended some eight courses.
- 2. In 1964, the facilities provide for the accommodation of 96 officers. A total of 384 officers attended some 16 courses.

CHANGES IN PENITENTIARY STAFF TRAINING Question No. 2,641—Mr. Matheson:

Have the qualifications and standards of training of penitentiary staff changed since 1963 and, if so, in what respects?

- Mr. D. S. Macdonald (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Justice): Since January 1, 1963, the following changes in the penitentiary staff training programs have taken place, resulting in an over-all higher standard of knowledge and physical ability:
- (a) Policy directives and instructions have been issued to each institution on the type of training to be undertaken within each institution. This includes, in addition to review training, the conduct of basic instruction training and basic relations training courses.
- (b) A continuous training program is in effect at the three correctional staff colleges.

This program includes induction training courses (three months) for all custodial recruits; methods of instruction courses; basic administration courses; correctional officer courses; instructor workshops for all staff training officers; senior officer courses.

- (c) Physical standards have been set for each type of course and applicants must meet these standards if they are to attend.
- (d) Prerequisites for potential course candidates are set for each specific course and include, amongst other things, position level concerned, satisfactory completion of specific institutional and/or penitentiary courses, as well as the appropriate level of physical ability.
