SMALL BUSINESS

Mr. Dennis Mills (Broadview—Greenwood): Mr. Speaker, my question is to the minister responsible for small businesses. The Canadian Federation of Independent Business released a study yesterday showing that small businesses along our borders from coast to coast are being adversely affected by our tax system. The threat of the GST is going to further complicate this. What does the minister responsible for small businesses say about those tens of thousands of small businesses that are being destroyed by this government's tax policy?

Hon. Tom Hockin (Minister of State (Small Businesses and Tourism)): Mr. Speaker, I would remind all of those border communities that the federal government is putting in place, under the GST, a rebate system for everything that visitors from the United States and other countries buy and take home. They get a complete rebate. We are making it very easy for them to apply for it through the duty-free shops. That is the best possible answer for our retailers.

Mr. Dennis Mills (Broadview—Greenwood): Mr. Speaker, I am not sure that the minister heard my question. The point is that a baby suit or a baby jacket is the same in Buffalo as it is in Toronto, Vancouver or Montreal. There is only one thing which is different; it is the price. What ideas does he have to put forward to keep those purchases in Canada?

Hon. Tom Hockin (Minister of State (Small Businesses and Tourism)): Mr. Speaker, I thank my hon. friend and congratulate him on his appointment as critic for small business and entrepreneurship. I am glad that he is trying to be creative, especially on this important issue. What is happening here, though, is that the manufacturers' sales tax is being removed for the first time in 65 years. The manufacturers' sales tax will lower the cost of running every single business in Canada, plus foreign tourists will be getting the rebate.

More important, the CFIB made the point yesterday that it feels the level of taxation is too heavy across Canada; municipal, provincial and federal. It believes that the municipal role is even higher than the federal role. We believe in working with the border communi

ties, as we have through our border community task force, to find ways to better market our products, to better position our products, and to help the small business community of Canada.

IMMIGRATION
