Visits to museums, social gatherings, trips, and study travels

The lectures are supplemented by visits to museums and industrial plants, and by trips to the environs of Berlin.

The following museums will be studied under expert guidance: Kaiser-Friedrich-Museum, Nationalgalerie, Schloßmuseum, Deutsches Museum, Pergamon-Museum. Furthermore Old Berlin, the State Library, various institutions of learning, work camps, and industrial plants will be visited. Trips will be arranged to neighbouring places of interest.

At the end of the vacation course a study travel to East-Prussia is planned.

The Lessing-Haus, Dorotheenstr. 13, is prepared to find suitable quarters in German families for the students. (Room and board per month about 150 to 170 Marks; rooms including breakfast 45 to 65 Marks.) Meals in commons 50 Pfg. to 1.- RM. Add to this fare from and to the University 9 to 15 Marks a month.

The **Hegel-Haus**, the dormitory of the Institute, Am Kupfergraben 4a and 5, (in the immediate neighbourhood of the University) has been established especially for the members of the Institute. If there are any vacant rooms other foreign students may occupy them. The residents have the opportunity to get in personal touch with the German students living there. The house has accommodation for 75 people; it has two large dining-halls, many social rooms, two lecture halls, the library of the Institute, gymnasium, and collections of pictures pertaining to German landscape, art, and history. (Board and room 150 to 170 Marks per month. No expenses for fares as it is situated around the corner from the University.)

The **Library** of the Institute in the Hegel-Haus, Am Kupfergraben 4a, consists of about 5000 books covering all branches of German culture and civilisation. The library is open daily from 9 to 17 (Saturday from 9 to $13^{1/2}$).

Examinations: At the end of the courses an examination (written and oral) may be taken. After passing the examination of the advanced course the candidate receives a certificate testifying that he has a sufficient knowledge of German to pursue his studies at a German university with profit.

Teachers may acquire a **Diploma** by a special examination (Diplomprüfung) held at the end of the vacation course. A special fee is charged for the examination for the Diploma. Rules and regulations may be obtained from the secretary of the Institute.

The **tuition** amounts to 120 Marks and entitles the applicant to attend 60 hours of language courses and 60 hours selected from II and III. Other groupings of courses are possible. The tuition further entitles the student to all special activities. A deposit of 20 Marks (this fee will not be returned) should accompany the application sent to the Institute of International Education, the remaining fee (100 Marks) to be paid at the University in Berlin. No students will be registered for a course until the tuition fee is paid.

The Institute does not only organize the vacation course described above but it also offers 8 weeks' courses all the year around: Autumn course (September/October), two winter courses (November/January and January/March), spring course (March/May) and summer course (June/July). There are language classes in 4 grades (beginners', elementary, intermediate and advanced). There are special courses for teachers and lectures on literature, art, history and various other subjects. The fee for one course is 80 Marks plus 10 Marks registration fee for newcomers.
