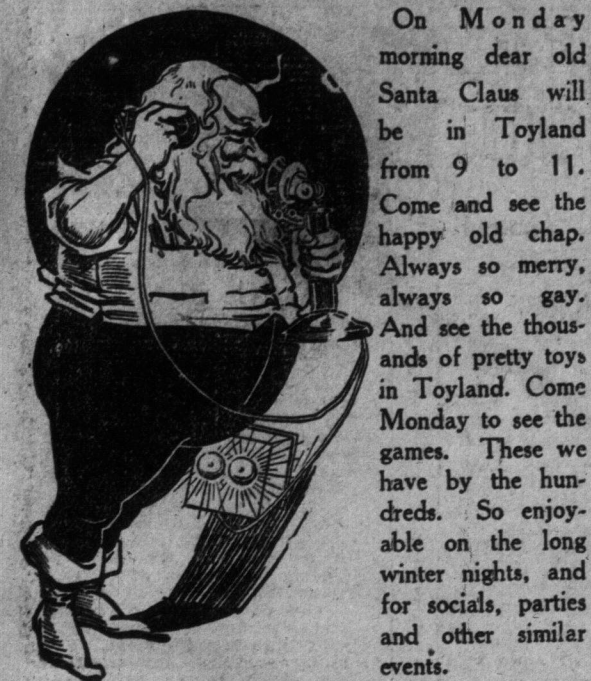

RAILWAY BOARD DECIDE REGULATIONS ARE JUST

But Commissioner Kittson is a Dissident Minority—City May Try to Appeal.

The judgment of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board upholding on all points the street railway's regulations respecting the installation of the pay-as-you-enter system, the prohibition of smoking and other rules may be appealed against by the city. Mayor Geary announced yesterday afternoon that he had instructed Corporation Counsel Drayton to report on whether there is any recourse left. "It is just a silly attempt by the company to force modern ideas upon antiquated methods," declared the mayor, referring to the conversion of ordinary cars into the pay-as-you-enter system. "I spent an hour last night in watching closely the operation of the system, and the way it worked out was absolutely wretched."

The railway board gave its approval on the affirmative votes of the chairman, James Leitch, and A. B. Ingram, with the third member, H. N. Kittson dissenting. Mr. Kittson's reasons for objecting are almost precisely those offered by Mr. Drayton, on the city's behalf.

The Official Order. H. N. Kittson dissents.

Dissenting Opinion.

Mr. Kittson is of opinion that the company's bylaws should not receive assent on the following grounds:

1. The bylaw, as drawn, while it provides for an unobstructed entrance to the cars, provides for no unobstructed exit.

2. In any case, exit by back door should be permitted when more convenient to passengers, especially as giving conductors right to pack people in front of cars will obstruct exit by front door.

3. Conductors should not be compelled to stand on back platform without protection from the weather.

4. The power given to conductors to eject passengers is liable to lead to unnecessary breaches of the peace.

5. The bylaw, as drawn, being intended to meet the altered conditions caused by the introduction of pay-as-you-enter system, should not come into force until the company has provided proper pay-as-you-enter cars.

6. The increased penalties sought to be imposed are in my opinion oppressive.

7. The looking of front doors of trailers is, in my opinion, dangerous, as in case of accident, people could not quickly escape from cars.

Mayor Receives Complaints.

The mayor has received many letters of protest against the company's regulations and innumerable complaints by phone. One correspondent, A. C. Bundy, 24 West-avenue, in support of his argument that trailers with front doors looked like "death-traps," tells a personal experience. On Thursday he was in trailer car No. 315, motor car No. 1124, running along King-st., when it was crashed into by a belt line car, smashing the front of the latter car, the occupants of the trailer were thrown violently forward and cut with glass. He and others tried to make exit thru the front doors, but found them closed. Had the belt line car been traveling at a greater speed, Mr. Bundy thinks many people would have been killed.

CHINA TO STAMP OUT OPIUM

Measure Passed to Prohibit Culture and Importation.

PEKIN, Dec. 2.—As a result of the extraordinary agitation in recent months by Chinese anti-opium societies, the imperial senate to-day passed a resolution almost unanimously looking to the drastic extermination of the drug.

The international transportation of opium will be abolished in the sixth month of the coming year (July, 1911), and the planting of the seed and smoking will be prohibited from the twelfth moon (January, 1912).

The foreign government is also enjoined in the resolution to seek the abrogation of the opium treaty with Great Britain and so prevent further importation from India.

Twenty-Five Hurt in Wreck.

LAMONT, Mo., Dec. 2.—Twenty-five persons were injured, one seriously, when three coaches on the Missouri Pacific Railroad passenger train No. 4 from Kansas City to St. Louis left the track four miles west of here early to-day.

While the train was running at high speed the smoker left the rails, dragged with it the chair car and the two Pullmans. These last three rolled down a 25 foot embankment and turned over, the last Pullman turning over twice.

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WIRELESS CALL FOR RESCUERS

Responded to by British Ship—Passengers All Safe.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 2.—The Alaska Steamship Company's steamer Northwestern is hard and fast on the rocks at False Bay, San Juan Island, four miles from Roche Harbor. She went on at almost high tide, has thirteen feet of water in her forward hold, and may be a total loss.

The Northwestern left Seattle for Valdez, Alaska, last night with 26 passengers and 600 tons of freight. She struck the rocks at 2:40 a.m.

The British steamer Dec, which was near, responded to a wireless call from the Northwestern, and took over the passengers and mail, which it is expected will be landed at Victoria.

Archbishop Bruchesi's Denial.

MONTREAL, Dec. 2.—Archbishop Bruchesi smilingly anticipated a press representative's questioning regarding the Toronto Globe's Ottawa despatch respecting his grace's alleged designs on the Holy See.

"It is all too false and absurd to bother about," he said. "Of course, the suggestion that I had begun my campaign to secure the office of pontiff thru bribery is wicked, but it carries its own refutation on the face of it. Whomsoever lack of knowledge of the procedure of the church."

Must Not Be Administrators.

ROME, Dec. 2.—The official bulletin of the Holy See to-day publishes a papal decree forbidding ecclesiastics to occupy administrative posts. Wherever they held them within four months of the date of the decree.

To Rebuild Sanitarium.

Chairman W. J. Gage called a preliminary meeting of the board of the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives yesterday afternoon to discuss future plans for rebuilding the burned Weston institution. It was reported that proper provision had been made for all the patients in the interim of rebuilding. Thirty were moved to Gravenhurst Sanitarium and fifteen to the Hospital for Incurables.

The origin of the fire will likely remain a mystery. Defective wiring, defective pipes or overheated pipes may have been the cause.

"Had it started one night later, it would certainly have been discovered in time to have prevented any serious consequences," said Dr. W. J. Dobble, physician-in-chief. "Prior to Dec. 1 we do not have an engineer in charge of the furnaces, as very heavy fires are not necessary until after that date. An engineer had been engaged to start Thursday night."

A Typewriting Record.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 2.—H. O. Blair, dell, the world's champion typist, established a new world's ten-minute record last night. He wrote 1,144 words in that time and made only eleven errors.

Chicago Limits Skyscrapers.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Two hundred feet will be the maximum height of buildings in Chicago hereafter, a reduction of 60 feet, as at present permitted.

RETIREES FROM POLITICS

The Orange Sentinel makes the following editorial announcement: H. C. Hocken has announced his decision not to be a candidate at the coming municipal election in Toronto. He takes the position that his successful opponent should have a second term without opposition.

Mr. Hocken feels that the work he has to do on The Sentinel is of greater importance at the present time than to serve in the city council. It is improbable that he will ever be a candidate for public office again. One form of public service is enough for a man. Mr. Hocken makes his choice deliberately and cheerfully to follow the calling for which he has been trained from boyhood.

Floods in France.

PARIS, Dec. 2.—Flood conditions are again general throughout France. About 3 1/2 feet of rain fell in November and from all sections come stories of immense damage done.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—The house of commons will adjourn for the Christmas recess on Dec. 14. It will reassemble on Jan. 10.

AGED WOMAN, STRANGLED

Wallet With \$3000 is Missing—A Virginia Tragedy.

SISTERSVILLE, Va., Dec. 2.—Mrs. Elizabeth Allen, aged 87 years, a wealthy widow, was found dead this afternoon at her home at Shirley, near here. Three thousand dollars, which she had in the house, is missing and the coroner believes that she was strangled to death, after which the robbery was committed. The house showed evidence of a fierce struggle. In a house twenty feet away Mrs. Allen's son, John, is dying from tuberculosis.

Attorneys for Mrs. Allen went thru the house late to-day and found \$172 sewed in an old quilt and \$12 in an old sofa. There is missing an old wallet in which Mrs. Allen is known to have had over \$3000 cash, with bonds, notes and other securities.
