Altho the exceptionally cold summer and early snowfall have been hard on western grain, samples of oats and peas which have been grown to maturity 200 miles north of Battleford, Sask., have been received at the forestry branch at Ottawa. In view of the fact that the grain did not mature in some sections of the prairie provinces this season, owing to the cold weather, the samples are regarded as a remarkable illustration of the productive capacity of the far north, even in a backward season.

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
