Elson's stomach will be sent to the provincial analyst at Toronto for examination as to the cause of

Since Saturday there have been many rumors afloat, and these were carried to the ears of Col. Farewell of Whitby, county crown attorney, who open ed an enquiry this afternoon before Dr.
Bascom of Uxbridge, after a postmortem examination of the body by
several physicians from various places
in the Counties of Ontario and York. Elson was seized with a chill during the drive home and vomited considerably, according to the testimony. He had a glass of ale before starting, and Dr Eastwood's, where he grew rapidly worse and much stimulant was given. This consisted of six or seven grains of phenacetine, 15 drops of laudanum, whiskey, gin injected hypodermically five or six times, and two or three injections of digitalis, strychnine and these methods were usual in such cases. In the course of the discussion in the press as to the financial loss to certain judges in the event of the clause forbidding them to be connected with any of the financial concerns being strictly enforced the name of Justice Ouimet was mentioned as interested to a considerable extent.

According to the rumor referred to a
