London, Sept. 18.—The Times will to-morrow publish a despatch from Berlin, saying that the recent law increasing the bounty on sugar for export has led to compulsory overproduction and a lowering of prices in Germany. For instance, a hudred kilograms of sugar sold in March at 24 1-2 marks, the same quantity now brings only 17 3-5 marks. A meeting of manufacturers has been held in Berlin, at which it was decided to ask the Government to effect an international agreement for the universal abrogation of sugar bountles.
