Trade in all classes, excepting fat cattle, was generally good, altho sheep and caives sold at a little lower quotations.

The market for fat cattle has been for some time in an unsatisfactory condition, about two mouths ago deliveries for some reason were light, both for butchers and exporters. On this account, and this alone, prices advanced, as shippers who had space taken, had to have the cattle.

When prices were high everybody became imbred with the idea that a scarcity existed and held on. Later, as everybody knows, when prices broke, a rush to market has ensued, culminating to-day with the most unsatisfactory state of trade that has existed in years. Prices have gradually declined for several markets, but to-day was the lowest yet reached, the market closing with several loads of good batchers cattle still unsold; some of which would have sold readily at \$5.40 and \$5.50 per cwt. a month ago.

Exporters.

Prices ranged from \$4.90 to \$5.60, the latter price being obtained for a picked lot of 9 prime cattle, 1370 lbs. each, by McDonald & Maybee, but there were no loads sold at any such price. The bulk of exporters, as will be seen by the representative sales quoted, sold from \$5 to \$5.25 per cwt. Export bulls sold at lower prices, as some dealers seemingly did not want them, having received instructions not to ship them. Prices for bulls ranged from \$3.25 to \$3.80, with something choice at \$4 to \$4.10.
