### AMERICAN GRACE DARLING

Woman Lighthouse-keeper Decorated for Saving Eighteen Lives.

London, Aug. 22.—One of the best-known personages of Newport, America's fashionable seaside summer resort, is the woman lighthouse keeper, Miss Ida Lewis, who has for 28 years vigilantly kept alight the beacon on the Lime Rock, of the harbor.

Last March Miss Lewis celebrated her 68th birthday, and the jubilee of her residence on the rock. Her father was the keeper of the light, but for seventeen years was a paralytic. His daughter performed the duties of keeper in his behalf, and, through an act of Congress, was appointed to succeed him, being the only woman to hold such a position.

The Newport folks are justly proud of their Grace Darling, who has saved eighteen lives from the sea. She was only 20 when, one summer evening, just after dark, she heard from the lighthouse the cries of four young men, sons of prominent Newport summer residents, whose catboat had capsized. She rowed to their rescue, and after much effort saved them all.

The garrison at Fort Adams is similarly deeply indebted to her, for she has at different times saved five soldiers from drowning.

Her heroism has been acknowledged by Congress, which awarded her a gold medal. Gen. Grant, Gen. Sherman, and Admiral Dewey have been among her distinguished visitors, delighting to do her honor. Newport itself nearly 40 years ago presented her with a row-boat, and in it drew Miss Lewis through the streets to the old city hall, where she received the public thanks of the State of Rhode Island and the city for the rescues she made with such daring and clever seamanship.

America's Grace Darling still displays mental and physical vigor, and maintains the reputation of the lighthouse as being one of the best managed on the coast.

### POISONOUS NUTS

Prompt Measures Against a Deadly Novelty From Africa.

London, Aug. 22.—Dr. Collingridge, the medical officer of health for the city, reports how prompt action has prevented an epidemic of poisoning in London from nuts.

Six children who were taken from the Old Kent road and Southwark Bridge road districts to Guy's Hospital, one after the other, had unmistakable symptoms of vegetable poisoning.

Dr. Collingridge ascertained, after exhaustive inquiry, that the nuts had come from the East End to South London. He immediately stopped their sale wherever he found them, and Sir James Ritchie, the sitting magistrate at the Mansion House police court, has condemned four hundredweight of them as being unfit for human food.

Three other little sufferers were afterwards traced to Camberwell, but they had been treated at a local chemist's shop and were able to go home.

All the victims had, it seemed, purchased the "new Kellou nuts from Africa," a fruit novelty shaped like a cob-nut, with a rough shell, while the kernel had the appearance of a Brazil. A street hawk purchased from a wholesale merchant two hundredweight of these things.

To an interviewer the merchant explained that they were the unlucky venture of a ship's captain.

## MUNICIPAL LAUNDRY FOR MEMPHIS, TENN.

Police Would Thus Employ Time of Women Who Are Sent to Jail.

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 22.—One of the chief troubles of housewives—the washerwoman shortage—may be relieved if the city council does not interfere with the plans of Police Chief George T. O'Haver, who proposes a municipal laundry to occupy the time of female prisoners in the city jail.

Chief O'Haver's suggestion is primarily in the interest of humanity, for at present the women convicts work on the rock pile, performing the same labor as men, with the exception that their hours are shorter.

Chief O'Haver is in charge of the work of city prisoners, and while his orders are subject to review by the fire and police commission of the council, it is seldom that they are changed.

The chief has announced his intention of putting the laundry scheme in operation. The first test will be made with linen and blankets used at the jail. The washing necessary for these to keep them spotlessly clean, is not sufficient to occupy half the female prisoners half a day.

"If there is not enough work for the women from the city, we shall take in washing for them," says the chief. "There may be some complaint from the laundry interests, but I do not believe an objection on the grounds of competition will hold good."

"In the first place, it will be impossible for the police laundry to take in any but coarse articles for washing, owing to the constant changes which will be made among the prisoners performing this labor."

"This class of trade is not solicited by the laundries of the city, and I think most of them refuse to accept it."

"The washerwoman shortage is a constant cry. I think that the municipal laundry system may do away with this, if not in one way, then in another."

"There are hundreds of vagrant negroes in Memphis, many of whom work possibly only one day in the week. I have prepared a rigid order to clean out all sections infested by vagrants. It is one of the worst evils the police have to contend with, and one with which we have been unable to cope until now, a new law having gone into effect."

"These women will be made to work one way or another. If they want to hire out or take in washing in their own homes or perform other honest labor, well and good. If not, they will be hauled into court and sent to the city prison, where they will be made to work without compensation."

"Then again, the lighter work for the women prisoners will make it easier for police officers to get convictions in vagrancy cases."

"The police judges are reluctant to sentence women, white or black, to the rock pile, but with washing as the heaviest work, I think this objection will be removed and we will be able to obtain sentences severe enough to clear out the city and at the same time benefit housewives."

### FIGHT WITH JACKALS

South African Planter Has Terrible Experience in the Bush.

London, Aug. 22.—Mr. Clarke Kuir, a British settler, had a terrible fight with jackals, near his home at Beaufort West, Cape Colony.

What he took to be a herd of buck approaching him turned out to be a pack of "Panne" jackals, the large variety so much dreaded by farmers. He fired and killed the leader.

The others advanced on him, and a grim fight against overwhelming odds began, for he was alone in the bush. Using his rifle as a club, Mr. Kuir disposed of a few more of the brutes, but his weapon broke, and he was left with only two barrels to defend himself. By this time he was fearfully torn and mauled, and was growing exhausted.

Just before he sank to the ground unconscious one large jackal sprang on his shoulders and buried its teeth in his neck, and he remembered nothing more. When he recovered his senses he was in a sheep kraal with four friends who had saved his life.

They came on the scene as he was falling, and as the infuriated beasts were rushing on him to tear him to pieces a few shots and a combined rush scattered the animals in all directions.

### FRENCH FIERCE FIGHTERS

Too Ruthless in Slaughter of Moors Say German Critics.

Berlin, Aug. 22.—The attention of the German Government is fixed upon the events at Casablanca more than upon any other subject in Germany's external relations. The presumption, of course, is that the French Government will observe its declarations at the beginning of the operations, and remain in Morocco only long enough to restore order. Yet, the indications are that France's definition of that period will depend on developments in the situation, and may be a long one. The principle of the French action is considered to be altogether correct.

The German Government under similar conditions would have acted as France has done, in other words, she would have sent warships to Casablanca had German subjects been killed. But the French action, although sound in principle, is looked on officially here as not being well managed, and as being characterized by a certain degree of ferocity and slaughter that might have been avoided.

## FIRE RAGES ON OCEAN LINER
