BOUGHNER**QUEBEC BRIDGE DISASTER**

Jury Fails To Find Cause, Company Are Exonerated.

Quebec, Sept. 13.—It was 12:40 a.m. when the coroner's jury rendered their verdict, through Mr. Delage, M.P., president, into the loss of life on the Quebec bridge disaster, after 53 minutes' deliberation. The verdict was as follows:

"That the deceased (La France) died from injuries and nervous shock sustained in the collapse of the Quebec bridge. We have been unable to establish the real cause of the collapse, but we think it our duty to declare that according to the proof furnished during the inquest, all necessary precautions were taken for the construction of the bridge without danger."

BRIDE DROWNED.

Philadelphia, Sept. 13.—Mrs. Marquerite Croft, a bride of a few weeks, and wife of John Croft, of New York, was swept overboard from a yacht in the Delaware River here and drowned.

The Glasgow office of the Allan Line cables to Toronto and Montreal, and also advises their local agents that the trial trip of the new steamer "Gramplan," on Thursday was very successful. The vessel attained a speed of sixteen knots.

The Power Question.

A dispatch from Toronto says: "Hon. Adam Beck and Premier Whitney had a lengthy conference today on the power question. 'Till the contract is signed and we have something definite, there is nothing more to say,' remarked Mr. Beck after the interview. It is understood the matter is progressing satisfactorily."

Peculiar Situation.

Although holding the necessary education department certificate, Mr. A. Stuelwasser, recently engaged to teach German in the Berlin schools, could not speak the language fluently enough to meet the requirements, and the school association will now request the permission of the minister of education to engage a German teacher who does not possess the departmental certificate.

Company Settles.

The Southwestern Traction Company has settled with Mrs. Colley and Miss Sanderson, who took proceedings against the company for damages on account of injuries received by them through a runaway near Union recently. It was claimed that the horses were frightened by the engine which was operating in the vicinity. The company paid Mrs. Colley \$200, Miss Sanderson \$125, and paid the physician \$200.

Police in Hamilton.

Hamilton Spectator: The police commissioners met today at noon to pick a man for the police force, but did not consider any of the three applicants for the position worthy to wear the blue. The objection to all was that they were not "chesty" enough. None of the three measured more than 34 inches around the chest. Chief Smith asked the board to set a chest measurement for his guidance in taking applications to lay before them. He thought no man who measured less than 36 inches across the chest should be considered, and the commissioners concurred in this. Hereafter a man who applies to be a policeman will have to measure at least 36 inches across the chest.

Scalded to Death.

The Gazette, of Earl Grey, Sask., contains the following account of the death of the young son of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Minor, of that place, formerly of London, the child being a grandson of Mr. Robert Allen, of 433 William street: A very sad event took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Minor, near Earl Grey, on Friday last. Their eldest child got his arm into a kettle of boiling water that was standing on the floor and pulled it over on himself. Dr. Neatby was sent for, and he rendered what aid was in his power. However, the efforts to save the child's life were unavailing, and he died early next morning. Fortunately the little fellow did not appear to suffer much, the hot water probably having killed the sense of feeling, and he passed away as in a sleep. The funeral took place on Sunday at Earl Grey Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Elton conducted the service. The child was two years and three months old—an age when his sad and sudden death will be severely felt by the parents, who have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

LAKE ERIE IN A FURY

Vessels Wrecked—Steamer Aground—Boats Held Up.

Detroit, Sept. 12.—Two schooners wrecked, two more forced to seek shelter in the nearest port, and north-bound boats from Lake Erie and eastern points held up by terrific wind storms are the results of the first gale of the fall season which descended upon the Great Lakes yesterday. The tornado-like velocity of the wind, coupled with driving sheets of rain, was general throughout the entire lake region, reaching as far north as the Soo and completely covering Lake Erie.

One steamer is aground at Lime Kiln crossing. At Muskegon two other schooners, after weathering the terrific sea kicked up by the gale for two hours, sought shelter in port. On Lake Erie the storm raged in all its fury and several boats are yet to be heard from. Whether there were any fatalities is yet known, but vessel owners with boats en route between here and eastern ports are much worried as a result of the storm.
