London, March 12.—Enver Pasha, who has just returned from Asia-Minor to Constantinople, has informed the Turkish Parliament that the military situation is better than at any time since the Turks entered the war, according to a Reuter dispatch from Constantinople by way of Amsterdam. Enver Pasha is quoted as saying: "We and our allies await with calm confidence any offensive which the enemy may launch in the coming spring. The chamber will pardon me if I preserve silence regarding the action which we on our part propose to take.

Why They Retired.

"The safety of the Turkish coast and the Dardanelles is better assured than

the Dardanelles is better assured than ever before. On the Sinai front the situation is unchanged. On the Mesopotamian front we retired northward for military reasons. For similar reasons we have drawn in toward Kermanshah on the Persian front. The situation on the Caucasus front is unchanged. To sum up the whole outlook justifies confidence in the future. Thanks to the Almighty we shall obtain the final victory."

# FRENCH MAKE MORE GAINS OVER ENEMY IN CHAMPAGNE WAR

Further Progress Made, Is Report of Paris.

PATROL ENCOUNTERS

Successful Attacks Made On Trenches in the Woevre District.

Paris, March 12-Noon.-The French entinued their offensive operations in the Champagne last night. Further gains in the region of Maisons-dechampagne are reported in today's official announcement. Prisoners were taken in raids and patrol engagements at different points on the front.

Patrol Encounters. Patrol encounters occurred in the sector of Auberive. The number of machine guns which we have captured in the region of Maisens-de-Champagne has been increased to 12.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen was the leader of the revolution which created the Chinese regulblic. After serving as first provisional president he resigned and, after a stormy political career, during which he was several times reported to have been assassinated, he identified himself with the rebellion against Yuan Shi Kai. After the fall of Yuan Shi Kai he disappeared from view and was reported to have taken refuge in Japan, fearing that his life was endangered if he remained in China. In August, 1916, a dispatch from Shanghai said that Dr. Sun Yat Sen had returned to that city and was taking a prominent part in the councils of the more extreme Chinese reformers. Nothing has been previously received here in regard to nis communication to Premier Lloyd George.
