DAIRYMEN LIKE SYSTEM OF SELLING ALL CHEESE TO COMMISSION AT GOOD PRICE

National Council Discussed This and the Oleomargarine Situation.
Frank Boyes, former reeve of Dorchester, has returned to his home in that village after having attended a meeting of the National Dairy Council, eastern executive, held at Ottawa, recently. At this meeting a protest to the department of agriculture was made, and this department was urged by those present in a motion to take action regarding express rates on milk. It was also decided unanimously to engage in an educational campaign throughout the Dominion, demonstrating the inferior value of oleomargarine as compared to standard dairy products.

Exportation of cheese to the British Isles was the chief business discussed at this convention. During the war the exportable surplus of Canadian cheese had been sent to England, and owing to difficult shipping conditions this product had been purchased by a cheese commission, the price being fixed in England. This body, representative of the dairy interests of Canada, urged the government, in the best interests of the cheese trade, to continue the procedure of having the exportable surplus of cheese from the Dominion purchased by a cheese commission. In addition to this, it is desired that the price set in England should be as high as possible, which may be obtained in the United States for cheese exported to that country. The government is urged to take steps immediately to arrange financial conditions and proper shipping facilities for exporting cheese to the British Isles, and that the market should be left open to the private trade.

WILLIAM S. HART IN

Cecil Thompson, program convener, favored the audience with several piano selections. Rev. Mr. Durford gave a short but excellent address, after which a dainty lunch was served.

At 5:20 a. m. a fire broke out in the bin that receives the dust from the blower system, at the rear of the Murray Shoe plant, Richmond and Piccadilly streets. The damage was estimated at about \$25. This is the second fire at that plant, a shed having been burned on Thursday.

About 10 a. m. a wagon of Dicks, the artist, standing in the rear of Abbott's carriage factory, 314 Dundas street, became ignited, it is thought from boys smoking nearby. The chemical apparatus extinguished it.
