Highway Robbery If Not Worse, Murdock's Opinion Regarding Deal in Sugar

Ottawa Wholesale Firm Tells Board of Commerce of Transaction After Three Other Middle Men Had Obtained Profit On Sugar—Will Widen Scope of Inquiry, Says O'Connor.

OTTAWA, June 1.—(Canadian Press)—When the firm of Provost & Allard told the board of commerce this morning of the purchase of two cars of sugar from a speculator named Robert Anderson of Montreal, at 2 1/2 per cent, after it had been "handled" three times at a profit, and admitted that their firm sold some to local grocers at 2 1/2 per cent, Commissioner James Murdock remarked: "You started out to get \$1,640 more on the purchase than normal profit. I regard it as highway robbery, if not worse."

Three Middlemen.—The hearing brought out the fact that Provost & Allard, who are wholesale grocers in Ottawa, bought this sugar because it could not get a better deal. They knew that refiners were selling at \$19.98 per cwt. Joseph Ward, Montreal; Vaughan Bros., Magog, Quebec; and Anderson were the three middlemen. They all had to share the 2 1/2 per cent profit. Provost & Allard stated that they sold a few bags at 2 1/2 per cent to grocers, because they knew that the refiners' price would cause them a loss unless they could get that price. The wholesalers' normal profit was 5 per cent above cost. Mr. Allard said that this was higher than ever before. Wholesalers formerly made 2 1/2 per cent.

SAYS MONEY TO AID TRADE WENT TO UNION M. P.'S

Jacobs Tells House of Fifty Million Appropriated For Balkan Trade.

OTTAWA, June 1.—Speaking on the budget debate in the House of Commons tonight, S. W. Jacobs (Georgian Bay) said that he owed it to his constituents to make a confession of faith. He intended to support the budget amendment which would provide for the expenditure of \$75,000,000 of public money at a time when the people were being taxed on the smallest luxury. Of the \$75,000,000 or so the Government had appropriated last year to foster trade with the Balkan States, much had gone into the pockets of supporters of the Government, many of them sitting in the House of Commons.

Lucien Paquet (Montreal) declared the Government's fate was definitely sealed. The demand for a general election came from all sources. The Government had initiated a greater production movement and then forgotten it. Spending money instead on commissions which did not commission. The same and sound policy on tariff matters was found in "the glorious pages of Liberalism."

L. David (Neepawa) urged the appointment of a commission to inquire into the Government's policy to assure their intelligent discussion. The budget broke a lot of new ground. As to trade figures, he called attention to the fact that the volume of goods exported was disappointingly low, though the value had increased. There was need for reduction of expenditures, but ministers could not fully control their department under the present system.

A reduction in the necessities of life which coincided with the imposition of luxury taxes would do much to bring unrest in the country. Mr. David said he found it necessary last year to vote against the Government's budget policy because no new taxation was then imposed. In the light of the new policy he thought it wise to support the Government this year.

CONSTANTINE HOPES TO RETURN AS KING OF GRECIAN PEOPLE

Former Monarch Declares Republican Form of Government Not Desired.

LONDON, June 2.—A Rome dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company gives an interview which a correspondent had with former King Constantine of Greece. The meeting took place at Salsomaggiore, where the king is taking the cure. Constantine predicted that the elections in Greece would result in the triumph of his party. Asked what he would do in such a case, he replied: "I never abdicated. I simply left Greece during the war. Even the French commander, Jonnart, admitted that the powers would not oppose my return if after the war the country called me back. Greece is opposed to a republican form of government. Venizelos knows that."

PERTH COUNTY TAX RATE BETWEEN ONE AND TWO MILLS

Government Grant for Good Roads in 1919 Was \$50,000.

STRATFORD, June 1.—The estimates for the County of Perth for the year were submitted by County Treasurer George Hamilton at the June session of the Perth County Council this afternoon. The total estimates for the year are \$68,763. Of this \$14,763 is expected from various sources, leaving \$54,000 to be raised by general taxation.

The amount of assessable property is over \$2,000,000. This will place the tax rate at between one and two mills. The levy for good roads within the county is \$85,000, of which 40 per cent is paid by the Government, leaving \$14,000 to be paid by the municipalities.

The Government grant towards good roads for the county for last year amounts to \$50,000.08, and is divided amongst the following: Wallace, \$827.27; Elma, \$2,653.46; Morningside, \$1,929.24; Logan, \$2,903.33; Elma, \$1,468.92; North Easthope, \$1,679.50; South Easthope, \$1,447.87; Hibbert, \$1,217; Fullerton, \$2,680.22; Boyrie, \$2,154.51; Bishard, \$2,940.92; Listowel, \$1,631.04; Mitchell, \$2,867.72; Milverton, \$9,576.38. Total, \$50,006.08.

TWO DIE WHEN AUTO RACES WITH EXPRESS
CALGARY, June 1.—Determined to beat the Canadian Pacific Express, a crossing, three miles west of Strathmore Monday afternoon, Harold Aldenhouse, was instantly killed, and Fred Genson was seriously injured and later died. A Simmenari was also seriously injured, and is now in a hospital at Strathmore. Alex Neilson, the driver of the car was called me back. According to local railway officials there is a clear view for about a quarter of a mile at the place where the accident occurred.

TEN DETROITERS FINED.
WINDSOR, June 1.—Ten Detroiters were fined for being intoxicated and for breaching the Ontario temperance act in Sandwich police court today. Several were arrested personally by Chief of Police Masters, who recently celebrated his 80th birthday.

SARNIA PATROLMAN SUSPENDED; POLICE COMMISSION ACTS

Investigation of Force To Be Made Following Recent Reports.

PORT CLOSELY WATCHED

Steps Taken To Check Smuggling of Sugar and Liquor.

SARNIA, June 1.—Following a meeting of the Sarnia police commission today, it was announced that Patrolman Fraser of the local force had been suspended, following his appearance in the Sarnia police court, where he was fined \$300 and costs under the O. T. A. and that an inquiry will be held. While members of the commission were tonight to make an announcement concerning conditions of the local police force, it was stated that Fraser's case was the result of an unsigned letter sent to Chief of Police Forbes.

Investigate Reports. It was also stated that an investigation is being conducted into the report that a large quantity of sugar is "missing" from a freight car that was standing on a local siding, and that members of the police force will be called on to make an explanation following certain reports received at police headquarters.

At a recent meeting Ald. Kirby inquired if all was well on the Sarnia police force, and it is now stated that at the next meeting of the council a number of questions will be asked Mayor Nisbet concerning Sarnia's "finest."

THE WATCH. While it is locally believed that no wholesale attempt has been made to smuggle sugar from Sarnia across the river to Port Huron, it was stated that local customs officials and port authorities are keeping a close watch to frustrate any attempts to send parcels of sugar into Uncle Sam's domain.

Customs officers have for the past two days been actively engaged in searching nearly six hundred motor cars crossing into the United States, but report that to date no sugar or bottles of Canadian "wet goods" have been found.

The anniversary services, which were held on Sunday, were also well attended. Rev. Executive Meets Today To Prepare To Beat Union Government.

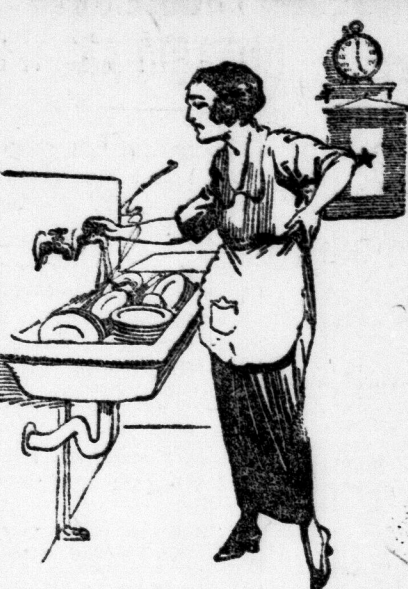
TORONTO, June 1.—A political course of action is to be mapped out by the executive of the United Farmers of Ontario here tomorrow in anticipation of the day when the Unionist Government at Ottawa decides to go to the country in a Dominion general election. It is understood that the Farmers' executives will discuss the question of Dominion politics in all its phases, and will decide upon methods to be followed by the United Farmers of Ontario in its aim to get control of the Dominion Parliament as it did the Ontario Legislature last October.

The executive of the United Farmers of Ontario tonight discussed plans for the proposed campaign for increased capital for the extension of the business of the United Farmers' Co-operative Company.

DIED VERY SUDDENLY.

TILSONBURG, June 1.—Death came very suddenly to George Wardle, a former well-known resident of Tilsonburg, who a few years ago purchased a farm three miles east of the town. Deceased was particularly well known in the building trade, having invented the Wardle barn and silos, scores of which he had erected in Ontario. He had a small workshop on his farm and while working there about 1 o'clock today he dropped dead. He is survived by his wife, one son, James, and three daughters. Funeral services will be held on Saturday with interment in the Springfield Cemetery.
