## FOE ATTACKS CHECKED **ALONG RUSSIAN FRON**

Threat to Counter-Attack Drove Austrians Back on Middle Stripa.

BIG ARTILLERY DUELS

Czar's Aircraft Becomes Active, Bombarding German Positions Near Riga.

LONDON, April 8.—An attempt of the Austrians to assume the offensive with considerable forces on the middle Stripa River, east of Podgacie in Ga-

Stripa River, east of Podgacie in Galicia, broke down when the Russians threatened a counter-attack, the Russian war office reported today. The enemy, then hurriedly withdrew to his trenches. An attempt of the Germans to approach the Russian positions north of Lake Narocz also resulted in their repulse.

Russian aircraft have also made successful flights over the German lines along the front of the Dwina River where German airplanes also dropped bombs. A Russian machine of the Nourometz type threw many bombs on German camps in the Riga region.

Great artillery activity has prevailed in all parts of the front. The Germans bombarded Shlok in the Riga region. Artillery and rifle duels prevailed on the Dwina front. The sector near flioukst was subjected to a concentric fire from the Russian batteries. Violent exchanges of fire are also noted in different parts of the regions facing Postavy, and Lakes Miadziol and Narocz, where the Germans sometimes used shells containing poisonous matter.

TOLEDO, O., April 9.—The Toledo street car strike was ended tonight. Cars will be operated on Monday. The men were given an increase in wages of 3 cents an hour, but they will not be permitted to wear union buttons, and the open shop rule will prevail.

The tie-up resulted a week ago last Tuesday when the men reported for work wearing the official insignia of the recently formed union. The company then sent its cars into the barns, and since that time all Toledo has had to walk or depend on automobile busses to take them to and from their work at exorbitant prices.

Von Hartmann Gives Assurance That Religious Life is Not Interfered With.



# AMERICA SHOULD ACT

Action Would Show it Shared in Duties as Well as Privileges of Monroe Doctrine.

SAID MAJOR G. H. PUTNAM

Told Empire Club Sympathy of U. S. Citizens With Cause of Britain.

A word of greeting from millions of Americans who hold that in this struggle right and justice belong to the cause of the allies was brough lunch in the Royal Cafe on Saturday by Major George H. Putnam, LL.D. Major Putnam is the president of the American Rights Committee, an organization with intensely pro-ally sympathies. His father was the first

sympathies. His father was the first American publisher to invade London, where he was born. This accident of birth and the close contact he has had with his birthplace has brought forth a close bond of union with Great Britain.

Major Putnam said he had spent a great deal of time telling his fellow-citizens of the stand that England has taken. It was true that the U. S. broke away from England politically, but many citizens were bound to her by bonds that could not be severed. A few years after the break people in Britain said that the States had fought the battle of liberalism and representative government for them.

Admired Britain's Premier.

Americans had a great admiration for Sir Edward Grey and Premier Asquith. With intense enthusiasm he spoke of the splendid results that were obtained with quietness by "the young stuff" Great Britain had guarding and supervising the outer edges of civilization.

Threatened by Germans.

At the conclusion of the meeting a resolution was adopted, 3400 to 40.

Never during his visits to England had he heard or read of a single Englishman desiring anything that Berlin had. Nothing was desired outside of a fair field and no favor. In Germany it was a common statement that the 18th century belonged to France, the 19th to England, owing largely to its powerful navy an dthe 20th century belonged to Germany. The British Empire was superseded and it was time for its dissolution. The major said it was the British navy that had kept the sens free and enabled Germany to profit thereby and build up her huge mercantile marine.
