THE LATE MRS. WM. GRIGG

Passing of a Much Esteemed Resident of Caradoc.

With feelings of regret we chronicle the death of Mary, the beloved wife of Mr. William Grigg, of lot 12, concession 3, of Caradoc. The deceased was born in Cornwall, England, 78 years ago, and sailed for this country with her husband in 1848.

The eighth day out from land they were shipwrecked, and had to put back or repairs. Starting again they finally landed in Canada in the early fall.

After a residence of two years at St. Catharines they removed to Caradoc and purchased the old homestead, where they resided ever since. The present site of their residence was at that time a wilderness, without roads or other improvements.

Their family of twelve children, all of whom are still living, includes: J. P. Grigg, now of Seattle, Alta.; J. W. Grigg, of Caradoc; and James, of Caradoc; the 3rd concession of Caradoc; Mrs. John Sutherland, of the 5th concession; Mrs. Henry Nagle, of Mount Brydges; Mrs. John Tull, and Mrs. Charles Bateman, of the Burwell road, Caradoc; Miss Addie, trained nurse, of Saginaw, Mich., and Miss Ellen at home.

It is a remarkable fact that this aged couple lived to see a family of twelve children grow to manhood and womanhood, this being the first break in the family.

For her Christian spirit and kindness Mrs. Grigg was respected by a large circle of friends, as was shown by the fact that she was followed to her grave by one of the largest processions ever seen in Caradoc. By her good judgment and loving kindness she kept united her twelve children, four sons-in-law, six daughters-in-law and several grandchildren as one family. She was borne to the grave by her six sons. The funeral sermon was preached at their residence by Elder Vale, of Granston, Penn.

Fine Set of Silver for Major Hays

Seventh Honors Popular Officer

Sir John Carling, Honorary Colonel, Last Night Inspected London's Crack Corps.

The Seventh Regiment, 350 strong, was inspected in the armories last night by Sir John Carling, honorary colonel of the regiment.

Considering the storm that was going on outside, the turnout was a very large one.

Promptly at 8 o'clock Col. Reid drew the regiment up in review order and Sir John Carling, accompanied by Lieut.-Col. Reid, Captain Reid and Lieut. Gregory, inspected the men.

The band then played a stirring regimental march, and as the regiment marched past Sir John took the salute.

Presentation to Major Hayes.

At the conclusion of the inspection the men were drawn up again in review order, and Lieut.-Col. Reid called Major George W. Hayes to the center of the hall, and on behalf of the officers presented him with a very handsome silver tea set.

The case bore the inscription on a neat brass plate:

"Presented to Major Hayes by Lieut.-Col. Reid and the officers of the Seventh Fusiliers, on the occasion of his retirement from the regiment in May, 1908."

Proud of the Major.

In making the presentation Lieut.-Col. Reid said the regiment had every reason to be proud of having had such an officer as Major Hayes.

In all the 33 years of which he had been a member of the Seventh he had worked hard and had ever had the interests of the regiment at heart.

It was largely through his efforts the Seventh Regiment Rifle Association holds the place it does today.

The officers and men regretted Major Hayes' retirement, and wished to present him with something by which he might remember them.

The Major's Reply.

Major Hayes, in replying, said that he wished to thank the officers for the beautiful present, and he assured them that he appreciated it, and would keep it all his life as a memento of their good wishes.

He had joined the regiment in 1875

and had removed to the United States, and in a congregation of only about 100 this is a heavy blow.

The next general conference of the church in Canada will be held here in September, when a successor to the late Bishop Washington will be named, and when it is possible Rev. Mr. Ball may be sent to another charge the following year.

He was to have taken charge of a church in Windsor, but owing to trouble there, the church is closed.

Sergeant Nanfan To Appeal the Case

Sergeant Arthur W. Nanfan, one of the best known officers of Wolseley Barracks, was yesterday discharged from the company by Col. McDugall.

The sergeant's period of three years as bugle instructor had expired, and it is understood he was told that he could re-enlist as a private but not as a sergeant. He was at the Goderich camp with the troops, but refused to take a lower position than that of sergeant, and was allowed to go.

Sergeant Nanfan is given a certificate of good conduct, and there is nothing against him on any score. He stated today that he will appeal the case and will carry it to the Dominion Parliament and to Sir Frederick Borden.

"I want no favors," he said. "All I want is justice. I feel that I have not been properly treated."

NEW POWER OFFER

TO HAMILTON CITY

Made By the Cataract Company—Would Submit Rates To Arbitration.

Hamilton, June 23.—Yesterday afternoon the Cataract Power Company made a new offer to the city for light and power. The letter was signed by General Manager Hawkins, of the company, and was presented to the aldermen at the city council meeting in the evening.

The letter recited that owing to the attitude of certain of the aldermen to the company and the prospect of a hydro-electric commission selling power to the city under Government and municipal control, the company feared the financial effect such a course would have on its several enterprises.

The company did not object to competition, but it considered it was unfair to be made the subject of attack by its own community to help a rival, and such a course made it impossible to get money to finance other enterprises. The company withdrew its other offers and agreed to let the city have power for pumping and street lighting at its own price. The city could fix the rates to be paid. The company relied on the honor of the city to treat it fairly.

The letter added: "We trust there is no general disposition in Hamilton, unpopular as we are said to be, to injure our financial prospects and practically prevent us from getting money to be used in the best interests of the city."

The company further offered to arbitrate on the question of rates on incandescent lighting, claiming that the prices charged here were the lowest in Canada. The company suggested that this agreement be entered into for a period of five years, when it could be ascertained whether it would be better to deal with the company or then take out a contract with the hydro-electric commission. The aldermen decided to reserve

SALARY INCREASES OF CIVIL SERVANTS

What They May Amount To, as Recommended By Committee.

Ottawa, June 22.—In the House of Commons today Hon. Mr. Fielding said it had been intended to cover the point of additional provision for civil service salaries, contemplated in the civil service bill by items in the appropriation bill. The figures which the Courtney-Frye-Bazin committee submitted were 15 and 12 1/2 per cent for employees east of Lake Superior, and 22 1/2 and 25 per cent for those further west.

In reply to a query as to the intentions of the Government, Mr. Fielding said that the public employees must wait until the supplementary estimates come down.

The leaders are still negotiating in regard to the Aylesworth bill, New Ontario being the principal stumbling block in the way of a settlement.

The Opposition is still pursuing its obstructive tactics. On the motion to order to supply J. E. Armstrong brought up the question of the administration of the Indian department, saying "the matter might as well be discussed at length as the Government had decided to keep the House in session all summer."
