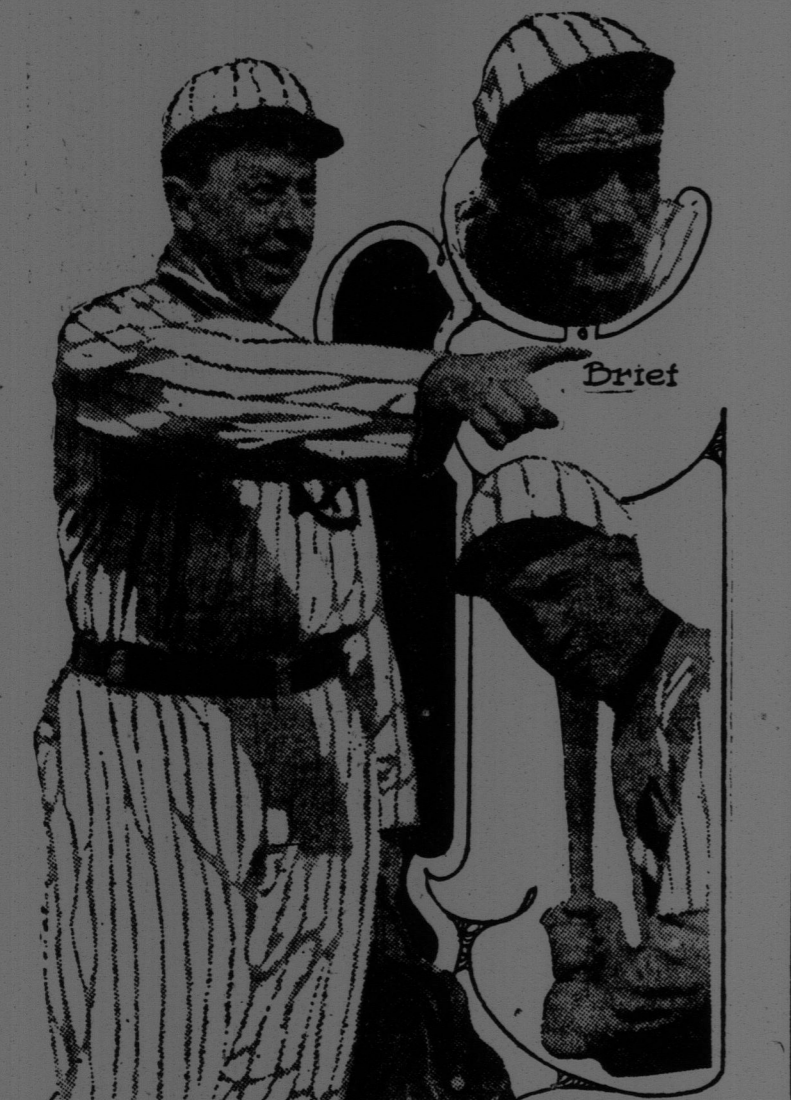


White Sox Mystery Team of 1915—It's Good Enough For Pennant on Paper

A letter from "Snowy" Baker of Australia tells of the harvest being reaped by boxers in that part of the world. Baker says that boxers are treated better in Australia than anywhere else. "Dave" Smith, who was twice defeated by Eddie McGoorty last year, collected from the Stadium management \$18,500. Of this \$6,000 was received for one fight with McGoorty. In that contest Smith lasted less than two minutes, never struck an effective blow, and was knocked out so completely that he had to be carried out of the ring. "Yet a second contest was arranged between Smith and McGoorty, and Smith actually received \$20,000 for getting into the ring with the big American. He can put a dumbbell weighing 287 pounds above his head with one hand at his side, and with two hands he has often lifted 329 pounds. On the stage of a local theatre ten years ago he raised a barrel of water with two men hanging on it several inches above the ground with the middle finger of his right hand.
