TREND HIGHER IN NEW YORK MONEY CENTRE

United States Steel Common Shows Initial Gains at Opening

OPTIMISTIC REPORT GIVEN OUT BY GARY

Trading Brisk in Montreal With Brazilian Showing the Way

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Stock prices moved irregularly higher at the opening of today's stock market under the leadership of United States Steel common, which showed an initial gain of two points in response to the optimistic statement on business conditions made by Chairman Gary after the close of the market yesterday. Initial gains of a point or more also were recorded by American Smelting, Reading, New York Central, Atchafalpa, "Nickel Plate" common and Mack Truck.

AT MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Oct. 6.—Prices on the local stock exchange at the opening this morning revealed an irregular trend. Trading was brisk, but spotty. Smelters, which lost 5 1/2 points Tuesday, opened with an overnight decline of a half point at 234, but in subsequent trading moved forward to 235 for a gain of half a point. Brazilian led the market in point of activity, but revealed an irregular trend. This issue came out at 115 1/2, off a half, advanced to 116 1/2, but in the later trading sold at the opening price of 115 1/2. Laurendeau was in good demand at 109 1/2, off a half point. Shawinigan at 24 1/2 was up a quarter. Breweries was unchanged at 68, and Power sold off three-quarters at 72.

H. Carson Flood To Head Bond House

H. C. Flood, who at present is the vice-president of Nabilt, Thomson & Company, is severing his connection with that firm at the end of this month and will continue in the bond business in a new firm which will bear his own name. Offices will be opened in Montreal shortly. In addition to this connection with the investment house of Nabilt, Thomson & Company, Mr. Flood is also a director of the Eastern Trust Company, the St. Lawrence Paper Mills, Northern Utilities and some other companies.

Herbert Carson Flood was born in Saint John, N. B., in 1890 and began his business career as a junior in the Royal Bank of Canada in Saint John. In 1907, three years later he joined the investment house of J. M. Nabilt & Sons and for two years was in the employ of the firm as a salesman. He came to Montreal in 1912 to be sold bonds for the local securities market. He was seen that Mr. Flood received his early bond sales training in the hard school of the Maritimes.

Mr. Flood is now in the civil service at Ottawa, and grandson of the late Carson Flood, Saint John.

ADVISES RADIO FANS HERE TO GET LICENSES

Official Says Money Goes to Help Clear Away Interferences

W. A. Rush, general superintendent of the radio branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, and D. Manson, chief inspector, left last evening for Ottawa. They had been in the Maritime Provinces inspecting the direction finding stations at Chebucto Head, Yarmouth and Red Head. While in Saint John they conferred with H. H. Brannen, local inspector, regarding radio conditions here and interference to broadcast reception.

HERE IN FEW WEEKS

It was said that the department took much interest in eliminating interference and recently purchased several specially equipped automobiles for the use of inspectors in locating interference. An inspector with one of these cars will be stationed in the Maritime Provinces and is expected to come to Saint John in about four weeks.

Mr. Brannen, in discussing the local situation, said that the department was going all it possibly could and the Saint John radio fans would not be neglected. He said, however, that it would help the situation considerably if all owners of sets would procure licenses as the funds realized from this source were used for expenses incurred in locating interference. Naturally the money was allotted to districts in proportion to the revenue received from each district and if the local owners all secured licenses it would show the large number of sets here and the government would be getting a great number of people from the United States. He promised to do his best to handle the immigration question in a manner that would be in the best interests of Canada as a whole.

He himself, he said, had come as an immigrant and the kindness with which the people of Canada had treated him, was the best advertisement the Dominion could have. Something had been said of selective immigration. It had been suggested that he was going to let down the bars. He was, however, not quite prepared to go that length, but he did believe that Canada could absorb many people from Great Britain other than from the farms, who would doubtless make good citizens.

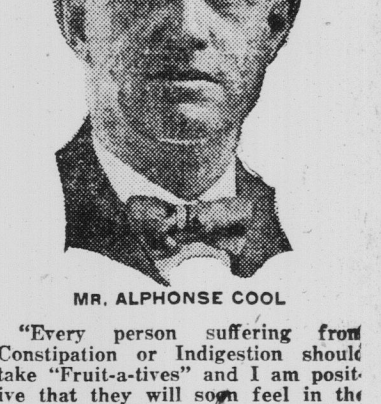
