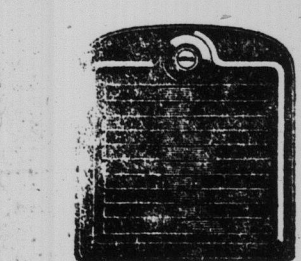


EASTMOUNT HA. TEA AND SALE IN PARISH HALL

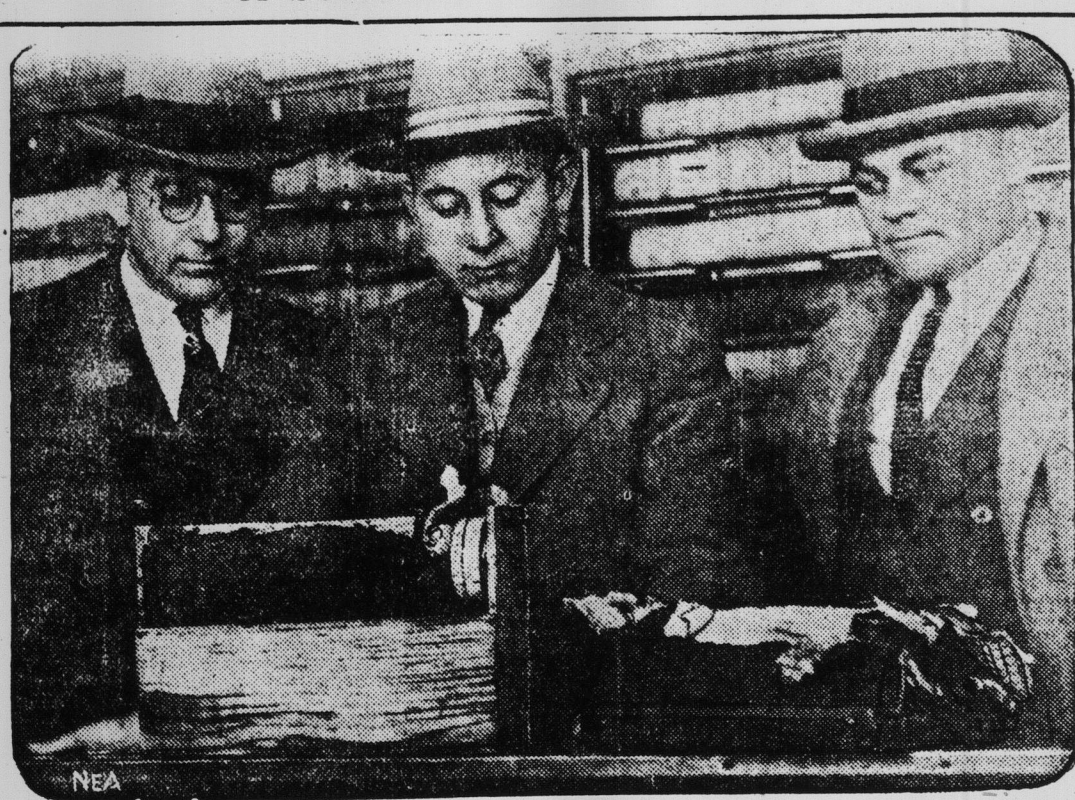

PROTEST LICENSE ON CITY HEARSE

Undertakers Send Letter to
Council; Loans Arranged For
Retaining Walls

A protest against classing motor hearses as trucks and collecting a city license was received from four city firms and read at the meeting of the city council yesterday afternoon. The letter was signed by N. W. Brennan and Sons, Annie O'Neill, P. J. Fitzpatrick and G. A. Chamberlain. It was referred to the mayor and city solicitor for a report.

The Carleton Branch of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League, invited the members of the council to attend the annual Armistice day service of the branch on Sunday, November 7, at St. George's church. The invitation was accepted.

Commissioner Frink moved that loans for the two retaining walls in Main street, in front of the property of Mrs. Carson and E. N. Harrington, be merged into one loan of \$1,794. This carried.

The commissioner of finance and public affairs reported payments for October amounting to \$262,456.36 and recommended payments of the following departmental accounts: treasury, \$1,780.21; public safety, \$2,353.33; public works, \$2,239.30; water and sewerage, \$3,312.52; harbors, ferries and public lands, \$1,337.61. Adopted.

World News In Short Metre

LONDON—Umbrellas have dropped to pre-war prices which is an indication, say old timers, that this will be a dry winter. The umbrella manufacturers who have resorted to advertisements more than at any other period because of stiff competition in the trade, do not by any means give Robinson Crusoe credit for being the inventor of the umbrella idea.

BROOKLYN, N. Y.—A 15-year-old Brooklyn girl, who ran away from home "to get a rich husband like Peasey Browning did," and a man of 35 whom police were seeking in connection with her disappearance, got caught through a crossed telephone wire. When Detective Jenner lifted a telephone receiver to report to his district office, he heard the voice of a man and a girl. He learned that the girl was Florence. He "made a date," and her capture led to the arrest of Rudolph Manosio.

CONSTANTINOPLE—A Turkish-German treaty of commerce has been signed at Ankara, being one of several important events affecting Turkey's foreign relations, which coincided with the recent celebration of the third anniversary of the Turkish republic.

CINCINNATI—Dr. J. P. Geppert 76, who for half a century has been practicing medicine in Cincinnati, has completed a fast after going without food for 42 days. The object was to reduce his weight, and he lost 37 pounds. Dr. Geppert is five feet six inches in height, and he weighed 186 pounds before the fast.

WUCHOW, China—The whiskers of a tiger are supposed to bring good luck. Also, cut into small bits, the whiskers are said to make strong medicine, and the Chinese esteem them highly. Accordingly, a few days ago in Wuchow, when a tiger, tramped nearby, was received by freight, a crowd gathered and an auction was held. The whiskers sold for about 20 cents each, the buyer reaching into the cage and yanking them out himself.

WASHINGTON—After months of packing, the Frederick Canfield collection of minerals has been installed in the Smithsonian Institution. The 8,000 specimens, accompanied by an endowment of \$50,000 to be used for its increase, were given to the institution by Frederick Canfield, Ferro Monte, New Jersey, who died last July.

CROW AGENCY, Mont.—Two officers and a negro were killed and another officer wounded here in an exchange of shots following the officers' attempt to arrest Jim Bulfinch, a negro, who had hidden himself in a barn and was routed only after Crow Indian braves resorted to their traditional tactics of firing the structure with flaming arrows.

MASSEY ACTS FOR KING AT DISCUSSION

Visits With Delegates The Various Departments of Defence

LONDON, Nov. 2—Hon. Vincent Massey Canadian minister-designate to Washington, represented Premier Mackenzie King at today's discussion by the conference delegates at the air ministry.

These discussions included visits paid by the delegates to the various departments of defence.

The dominions will now submit their position on Empire defence at the next preliminary meeting of the conference. This has been arranged for Thursday, but may be postponed until next week. The proceedings of defence discussions are surrounded by an air of mystery equal to that which surrounds the committee of premiers. The British government, it is understood, has submitted a full and frank statement in regard to its defence proposals, indicating where possible danger zones might be considered to lie. There was no concrete scheme submitted, however, which suggested Dominion participation.

FIRE CAUSES \$500,000 RUSSIAN FILM LOSS

MOSCOW, Nov. 2—The principal producing plant of the Russian Soviet motion picture trust has been destroyed by fire, according to the Moscow correspondent of the London Daily Express.

Negatives of the six latest super films about to be released were lost in the flames. Among them was one entitled "How Douglas Fairbanks Fought With Egon Elyinsky on Account of a Russian Trip. Elyinsky is the favorite Russian comedian.

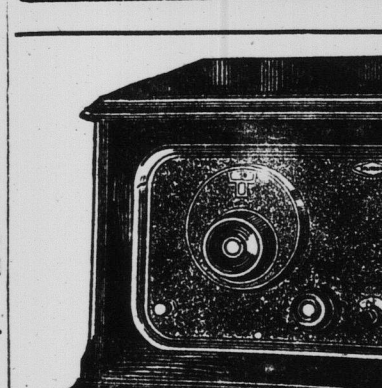
Property damage amounted to more than \$500,000 in addition to the severe setback to the new Russian film industry.

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OLD FORT ANNE HISTORY TOLD BY L. M. FORTIER

Lantern Slides Illustrate Fine
Address Given at N. H. S.
Meeting

The exceedingly interesting history of Fort Anne in Annapolis Royal and an account of the many treasures its museum contains, were given before the Natural History Society meeting last evening by L. M. Fortier, the honorary superintendent, who has been, in a very large measure, responsible for the fact that the Fort has been preserved and obtained the safe-keeping of some many historic relics. Pictures of the fort were exhibited and lantern slides were shown by Dr. William MacIntosh.

Judge George A. Henderson, the recently elected president, was in the chair, and in extending a cordial vote of thanks tendered to Mr. Fortier on the motion of Dr. MacIntosh seconded by Timothy O'Brien, Judge Henderson referred to the fact that Annapolis had been his childhood home and the address had had all the keener interest on that account.

AT PORT ROYAL.

At Port Royal in 1606 the first dramatic performance in Canada was given and there the Order of Good Cheer was founded in 1606-7. It was the headquarters of the French colonists for a few years until the British came and finding the garrison away demolished the fort and the French abandoned it.

In 1629 Sir William Alexander arrived with his colonists and repaired the original fort and occupied it about two years. When the new French governor arrived in 1622, the fort was in decay and a new site on the south shore was selected and a small fort erected, and its ruins can still be seen. When D'Aulnay succeeded as governor two years later he returned to Port Royal, but in 1630 the first Fort Anne was erected, and this fort was defended against LaTour, was taken in the name of Cromwell, in 1654, and was held by the British for 30 years, but came again under French occupation in 1685, and because of the ruinous condition of the fort the French government accepted the request that it be rebuilt, and although the new fort on the same site was not actually designed by Beauchamp, it was a perfect specimen of forts according to his principles. It was not quite finished in 1710 when it was captured by the British.

BEAUBONNE TYPE.

Lord Byng in visiting the fort at once recognized it as a Beauchamp type and had expressed surprise, as he had expected a fort of an earlier type. The British capture was made in 1710, when Francis Nicholson with a fleet of 30 vessels sailed from Boston Bay and landed soldiers on each side of the river. The garrison of 1,000 stood a siege of weeks against a force of 5,000. The two powder magazines held by the French are also in existence. The first was too much underground and

was found to be damp. For the second one stone was sent from France and a half feet thick. This has been carefully restored recently.

Mr. Fortier mentioned some of the notable people who have lived at Annapolis Royal, including General Williams, parts of whose old house still exist. The garrison of the fort, he said, had been gradually diminished and the last soldiers were withdrawn in 1854 at the time of the Crimean war, when Lieut. Wedderburn was the commanding officer, and desertions had dwindled the force to the officer, one sergeant and six men. The remnant was then ordered to join the regiment at Fredericton.

MENTIONS TREASURES

Mr. Fortier went on to tell of some of the treasures, mentioning the 800 pound brass cannon of the French period which had been given by the British War Office from Walwich, when it had been impossible to locate the cannons which the British had taken away. The old weather vane removed in 1758 was located in Vermont and brought back. The old key taken by Nicholson was located in the possession of the Massachusetts Historical Society, and that society most generously sent a delegation of three members to return the key in 1922.

The museum has seven pieces of Cromwellian armor, received from the Tower of London, and Mr. Fortier expressed appreciation of the courtesy with which the gifts had been presented. A judge's chair used in the Annapolis Royal court house is in the museum, and Judge Halliburton was one of those who had used it.

Mr. Fortier asked specially if any of his audience, or any one in New Brunswick could give him information concerning the family and descendants of Lieutenant Wedderburn.

MANY VISITORS.

One of the specially interesting facts mentioned by Mr. Fortier was that during the present year there have already been 8,144 persons conducted through the museum at the Fort. No charge is made, but there is a contribution box, and last year \$400 from this box was used for the funds of the local Historical Association.

BIRDS' BONES CARRY AIR.

The bones of all flying birds are said to be hollow and filled with air, thus showing that nature knew what it was about when it designed them for the air. This plan, as any physicist will confirm, makes for not only lightness but for the greatest strength. A solid bone, besides being heavier, would be less strong against strain such as a flying fowl is put to.

FINGER PRINTING.

It has been discovered that finger printing as a system of identification was practiced in China as early as 400 B. C. On some ancient walls finger prints of the makers have been found. The system spread from there to India and in Japan it was soon adopted for the identification of criminals. The hiring of illiterate labor in South Africa caused it to spread to the continent.

MILK HIGHER AT HALIFAX.

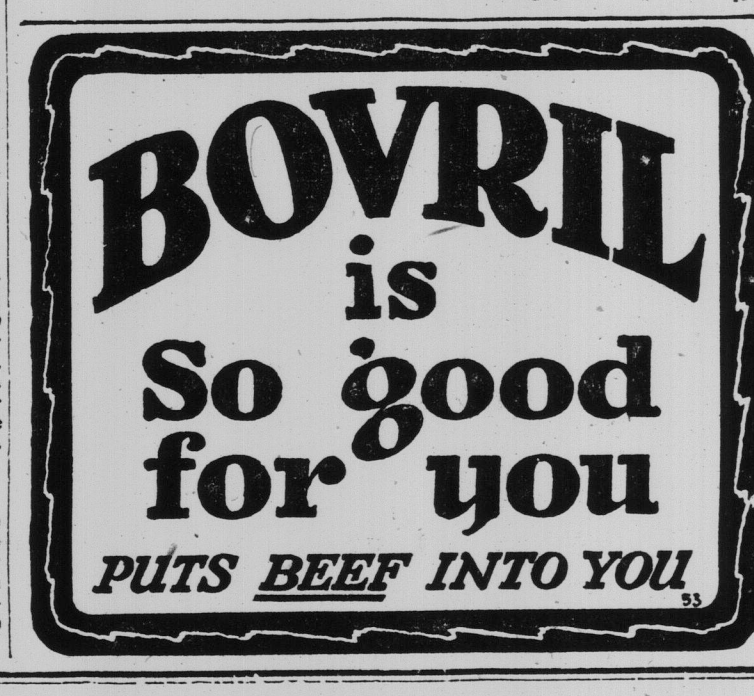
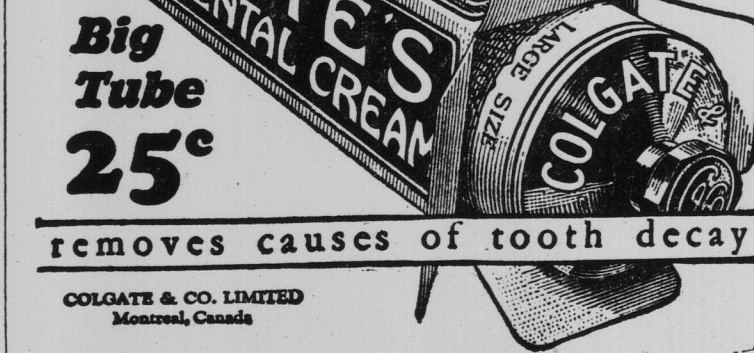
