Only Big Meet For Thunberg Is One In Saint John

GOODERICH WINS DISPUTED VERDICT

CAME TO FRONT IN LAST TWO ROUNDS WITH CLONIE TAIT IN TORONTO TORONTO, Nov. 24.—Jimmy Gooderich, lightweight champion of the world, won an unopposed decision over Clonie Tait, Canadian lightweight champion, in a ten round bout here tonight. Gooderich came to the front in the last two rounds and gained the verdict by a slight margin. Tait put up a clever fight against the champion and took the fourth and eighth round by a shade only to have the New Yorker come back strongly in the ninth and tenth.

LONE CANADIAN LOSES

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—A change in the system of judging boxing bouts under which the number of rounds won and lost will determine the result rather than the total point score of each contestant at the end, was decided upon by the State Athletic Commission today in a new move to obtain uniformly satisfactory decisions. The new plan, which is expected to have a far-reaching effect in pugilism as given the early rounds of a complete revision of rule 8 of the board's regulations, which had previously provided that "the contestant who scores the greatest number of effective points regardless of the number of rounds won or lost," should be declared the victor. The amendment to the rule requires that points shall be scored as each round progresses and that the board's decision, which the contestant who has to his credit the greater amount of the rounds fought is the winner.
