He informed the magistrate that he had the dog early in May and one day the animal jumped overboard.

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

BRITISH CAMPAIGN OPENED YESTERDAY WITH GREAT VIGOR

London, Oct. 14.—(Canadian Press)—The announced programme of the Communist Party in Britain includes nationalization of big industries and banks, state control of foreign trade, the capital levy, suspension of interest on national debt holdings of over £20,000; a minimum weekly wage of £4 with a forty-hour working week; a loan to Russia of £100,000,000 and cancellation of reparations war debts.

Dr. R. Dunstan is standing as a Communist in Birmingham West, the seat held by Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain. In the remaining eleven Birmingham divisions straight Labor candidates are being entered. At the election Birmingham (including Edgaston) returned a solid dozen Conservatives, including the two Chamberlains, Austen and Neville. Dr. Dunstan was defeated last year by Neville Chamberlain.

Probably the least exciting campaign in the whole kingdom will be in the Scottish district of Glasgow where T. P. O'Connor is returned unopposed with unflinching regularity at every election. O'Connor this year is again even leaving an election address. His principles, he remarked to friends, are the same as they were when he first appealed to the electorate thirty-five years ago and he has nothing new to say.

Wholesale Agreement. London, Oct. 14.—(Canadian Press)—Labor's chances of success at the polls in October 29 are seriously affected by agreements between Conservative and Liberal Associations in steadily growing numbers not to put up candidates against each other where supporters of the MacDonald Government are standing.

Canadian Candidates. London, Oct. 14.—(By British United Press.)—Herbert Holt—Capt. Holt, M. C., son of Sir Herbert Holt of Montreal, is one of the first who seems likely to benefit by the arrangements.

MACDONALD MAKES FIGHTING SPEECH TO OPEN CAMPAIGN

occupied so long by the old line parties.

"It is our success that made the trouble," Mr. MacDonald stated in an early speech. "If I had made a mess of Europe, and my friend, Wheatley, had made a mess of his job, we would not have been voted out in the House of Commons. They would have given us a much longer tether."

In his peroration the Premier emphasized the League of Nations practically dying because no great beneficent lead had been given to it. "We went to Geneva and gave that lead," he added, "and the League of Nations today is more vigorous than ever." The Premier complained that the Government had not fair play in the Parliament, where it had met with "pettifying partisan trickery, aimed to prevent an honest government doing its work."

In his peroration the Prime Minister appealed to the nation to put an end to contemptible party tactics by giving the Government the clear majority. Another salvo of cheering broke out as he resumed his seat.
