"It does not contemplate the addition of a school subject," Mr. Mortenson explained, "but rather the implication in several subjects of concern for the safety of children." Separate treatment of various classes of accidents in successive months is provided. September, October and November are given respectively to street dangers, fires, and weapons; the next three months to burns and scalds, next three months to burns and scalds, poisons and asphyxiation, and electricity; and March to June, inclusive, to falls, railway accidents, carelessness in play, and drowning. The work under each monthly classification will be graded to meet the requirements of the various ages between the first and eighth grades.
