TORONTO STORM OVER THE "PERS" Three Hundred Physicians Suspended from Privilege of Ordering Liquor.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—Replying to a storm of protest raised by the suspension of more than 300 doctors from the privilege of issuing liquor prescriptions, the Ontario Medical Association, of the Ontario Medical Association, says in part:—

"No members of this board would willingly prevent any sick person from obtaining liquor in any case of real medical need. It is well known to the board, however, that in many cases the prescriptions given by some physicians are given at the urgent solicitation of those who desire the liquor for beverage purposes."

"No member of the board would be willing to cast undervalued reflection upon any physician, but all the members conceive it to be their duty to refuse to allow the dispensary to be used, whether through physicians' prescriptions or otherwise, for the purpose of supplying liquor for beverage purposes."

"The National Industrial Conference Board, in East Thirty-ninth street, yesterday issued a statement showing the results of a comprehensive investigation of the cost of living for the country as a whole since 1914."

NOW 20.3 P. C. BELOW PEAK

Food and Clothing Prices Lower—Rent, Fuel and Light Higher, a Survey Shows—Top Reached in July, 1920.

(New York Times.)

The National Industrial Conference Board, in East Thirty-ninth street, yesterday issued a statement showing the results of a comprehensive investigation of the cost of living for the country as a whole since 1914.

"The total increase in the cost of living from the beginning of the war to November, 1921, was sixty-three per cent," the statement says. "The rise in cost of the major items in the wage-earner's family budget during this period is estimated to have been as follows: Food, fifty-two per cent; shelter, sixty-nine per cent; clothing, sixty-nine per cent; sundries, seventy-eight per cent. The report shows that the peak of the cost of living in the United States was reached in July, 1920. Since then the total cost of living has decreased 20.3 per cent. Food has decreased thirty-one per cent; clothing, thirty-nine per cent; and sundries four per cent; while shelter has increased seven per cent, and fuel and light, eight per cent."
