Birth Accepted With these facts in mind, it is easy to understand why her American birth has been a real obstacle to Lady Astor's career. "I believe that women's fight has just begun," Lady Astor declares. "The wave of sentiment roused by women as war has waned, and there is a rising reaction against increasing opportunities for women. There is also considerable apathy among the new women voters. This is especially noticeable as regards women jurors. It is difficult to stem the growing custom of challenging women jurors in cases involving a moral offense against a woman or a child. The sanctimonious grounds that the impending trial is too delicate for female ears, so long as so many women are found who are only too glad to get out of jury duty. Sometimes they actually withdraw voluntarily, if the judge gives them an opportunity. "Enthusiasm of the few alone will not do enough. Members Help Her However, aside from this rather exasperating attitude on the part of the men, there are other and more nearly insurmountable problems. Yet Lady Astor encounters no organized opposition, no cleavage in ideals between men and women. On the contrary, she receives invaluable support from men like Jack Hills, who have actually sacrificed their own popularity in their fight for feminism. There are a great many men in Parliament, however, who sympathize with a woman's point of view, but will not go the length of fighting.

There are certain bills, Lady Astor claims, "that naturally women are more interested in and more eager to pass than men. If there were more women in the House representing more votes and pressing for men's questions, it would make a tremendous difference, and bills such as the Guardianship of Infants Bill, the Equal Law Amendment Bill, and the working more just conditions for

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unmarried mothers and their babies would stand a far better chance of being passed quickly. "As a matter of fact," her political secretary interpolated, "Lady Astor is really like a woman minister without portfolio. Since she is the only woman in Parliament, most of the women's work is necessarily focussed through her, as their one real representative and the person most interested in legislation for women and children. The women's organizations, as well as countless individual women, tend to use her as their medium and mouthpiece. Approximately 1,500 letters are mailed to her every week, at least four or five times as many as most of the other members of the House receive." It is Lady Astor's belief that the future of women in English politics depends upon their ability to organize. A big step in this direction was the formation a few months ago of a big consultative committee, the outcome of a series of conferences of women's societies, called together by Lady Astor, and similar in aims and methods to the National League of Women Voters in America.
