EIGHT CHARGES ARE MADE AGAINST HIM

Court Proceedings Following
Police Act in Closing Insti-
tution in Winnipeg.

(Canadian Press.)
Winnipeg, Aug. 13.—Russell Dumas, alias Dr. Gordon Mayo, arrested on Wednesday when the Mayo-Curtis Medical Institute of Research here was closed by the police, was yesterday remanded for preliminary hearing on eight charges, seven being for alleged violation of the medical act and the other for alleged obtaining money under false pretences. He is said by the police to have led patients to believe the Winnipeg "clinic" was a branch of the medical and surgical institution in Rochester, Minn., conducted by the Mayo brothers. Dumas is said to be a native of Southampton, Eng. He came to Winnipeg from Toronto several years ago, following the death of a young woman, due to it is alleged, to a criminal operation; he was charged with murder but was acquitted. Later he was arrested in connection with the death of a married woman here and given five years in the penitentiary. This was in 1916. He was paroled a few months later, enlisted in the 20th Battalion and is said to have served in France with the Canadian Medical Corps in the non-commissioned ranks.

SPRUCE LAKE EXTENSION IS TAKEN UP

A special committee meeting of the common council was held yesterday afternoon to further discuss the proposed extension of the water main to Spruce Lake. Commissioner Jones, submitted his report on the matter. Little progress was made. The commissioner's report in part reviewed the agreement between the city and the original owners of the pulp mill. Last year Senator Jones, manager of the Nashua Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., had expressed a desire for a new agreement and negotiations had been entered into with the result that more favorable terms had been obtained. Under the new agreement the guaranteed amount payable by the pulp mill shall be \$8,160 yearly regardless of whether or not it is using the water. The matter was discussed at some length by all the commissioners, and the matter laid over for further consideration.

CHILDREN'S AID.

The monthly meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held last evening in the Children's Home, 68 Garden street, with the president, A. M. Belding, in the chair. The report of the agent showed that three children had been admitted to the home since the last meeting of the board. Forty-one visits were made during the month and seventy-four letters and postcards were written and sent out. There are now twenty children being cared for in the home.

SIR JOHN AIRD HERE.

Sir John Aird, vice-president and general manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, who has been visiting the branches of the bank in this district, arrived in the city last night and left this morning for Montreal. His election as vice-president was made known to him only a few days ago. He prophesied a great future for this province as a land of production and said that up to the present New Brunswick had only begun to scratch the soil. He said he considered New Brunswick roads very good, Nova Scotia roads not so good, and Newfoundland roads only fair. He hopes to return to this province next year and go over the ground he was not able to cover this time.
