CONDENSED NEWS

Despatches to peace conference circles from Budapest indicate that general demoralization has struck Bela Kun's army which is dragging back with utter lack of discipline.

Paris hears that Bolshevism in Hungary is confined almost exclusively to Budapest. Passes are said to be obstructing shipments of food to the capital, which is rapidly reaching a desperate state.

Only two formal addresses will be presented to the Prince of Wales during his three day visit in Toronto, one from the city and one from the Ontario government.

At Hamburg 300 vessels having that city as their home port have been delivered to the Allies. Of these thirty-one were owned by the Hamburg-American Line.

Forest fires in the Kootenay district are reported under control.

The Vancouver Trades and Labor Council is reported to be for one big union, and about to break from the International.

The Duke of Penhryn, of the House of Bourbon-Orleans, died suddenly in Paris today at the age of seventy-four.

Three soldiers were killed and ten soldiers and six civilians injured in an explosion on Thursday at a large munition dump seven miles northeast of Paris.

MADE FAST TIME
In the horse races at Northampton, Mass., on Wednesday Addio Guy in the 1000 yd race won in 2:08 1/2, which was within 1/2 seconds of breaking the record. It was made in the fourth heat and also the same time in the second heat. Addio was sixth in the first heat but took the net third.

The birth of twelve children in the city has been reported to the registrar of births since last Saturday. Boys and girls divided the honors, there being six of each.

FROM NEW GLASGOW
Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Fanjoy and family of New Glasgow, N. S., arrived in the city by motor last night and left this morning for Calais.

Versailles, July 17—It was announced here semi-officially today that Baron Kurt von Lersner, head of the German mission here, had been appointed chargé d'affaires to look after German interests in France.

Washington, July 18—The pre-war rate of twelve cents a pound on parcel post packages to Germany was re-established today by the post office department.

A 1914 LETTER OF KAISER

Berlin, July 17—(By the Associated Press) A letter written by former Emperor William on July 28, 1914, to Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, then Imperial German chancellor, is published here.

It says that after having read the Serbian reply to the Austrian ultimatum, it was the opinion of the Emperor that all Austria's wishes had been met and that all ground for war was removed. It adds, however, that as the Serbians "are not content and untrustworthy" that the Austrians should occupy Belgrade until the Serbians promise to arrange peace in Austria.

SAID PREFERENCE TO CANADIAN MANUFACTURERS

London, July 17—(Reuters)—Replying to a motion by Hon. A. Shaw, member for Kilmarnock, which proposed the abolition of income tax on profits from the sales of dominion produce in the United Kingdom, Chancellor Chamberlain declared the result of the motion would be to give preference to the manufacturers of the dominions as compared with the home producers. The motion was rejected by a vote of 15 to 19.

POPE'S LETTER TO THE BISHOPS OF GERMANY
Rome, July 18—Pope Benedict has addressed to the Bishops of Germany a letter expressing joy over the removal of the blockade. The letter recommends that an attitude of Christian charity be taken toward the question of reparation for war damages.

The Pope expressed confidence that the civilian nations, and especially Catholics, will give aid to the populations brought to a state of extreme need. He recommended also that all thoughts of hatred against former enemies be eliminated from the minds of German Catholics.

GENERAL STRIKE IN FRANCE MAY NOT BE WHAT WAS EXPECTED

Paris, July 18—The proposed demonstrative strike of 24 hours, set for July 20-21 will be far from general in Paris, according to the latest indications. The chamber of commerce and several independent labor organizations have posted protests against the project, while serious resistance is being manifested within the federation of labor itself.

The executive committee of the federation this afternoon gave out an intimation that in view of the measures taken by the government to decrease the cost of living the programme might be altered and that the railroad men, the postal employees and the workers in the provincial trades would perhaps not be asked to join in the strike.

MAY BE A GREAT TIE-UP IN CHICAGO
Chicago, July 18—More than 100,000 men employed in Chicago building operations will be idle by tonight unless strikes for higher pay involving about 80,000 of their number are called off. Approximately \$50,000,000 in construction would come to a standstill and other operations at an estimated cost of \$75,000,000 deferred.

The decision to declare a lockout was precipitated by the walkout of carpenters, who are charged by the employers with violating the agreement and refusing to negotiate a compromise. They now receive eighty cents an hour, but are holding out for \$1.

PROBATE COURT
In the probate court this morning, Judge H. O. McInerney presiding, the will of A. W. Baird was proved. He left an estate of \$25,000, of which \$7,000 is real estate. The will was proved by W. W. Baird, of Cleveland, Ohio, and P. B. Ellis, of this city, were appointed executors. C. H. Ferguson is proctor. After some small bequests the property is divided among his four children.

A property consisting of twelve acres of land with cottage and barn, situated on the Loch Lomond road, belonging to the estate of the late Walter Leyland, was sold at auction at Chubb's corner today by Dr. G. O. Baxter for \$1116. A three-tenement house on Leaside road in Marsh street also was offered by Mr. Potts, but was withdrawn at \$1,850.


MARRIAGES THIS WEEK
