PIERS ON CITY PROPERTY, WEST SIDE. If desired, future piers could be constructed on the city property on the West side of the harbor near the present wharf, and by so designing same, a wharf of considerable length, which is now there and in first class condition and having comparative deep water alongside, but the entrance of which is at present blocked, could be taken into use.

Site Near Head of Harbor. Regarding the site at the head of the harbor near the present intercolonial pier, to which the river during the spring freshets, has been made directly, I consider this a very good site for future wharfage if necessary, but there is generally no accommodation for railway sidings or other facilities except by expensive expropriation, for which there seems to be no immediate necessity.

An Offer to Board of Trade—Rivals For South Shore Subsidy

At a meeting of the council of the board of trade today a letter was presented from Harry M. Jones in which he announced his intention of starting in April to make a long distance flight by stages of varying length from Buffalo through Ontario and Quebec, around Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and thence to New Hampshire.

He would include New Brunswick in his itinerary and make a stop for a day at St. John if sufficient inducements are offered. The letter was referred to the exhibition association.

(Continued from page 1) New Wharves at West Side—Mr. Conolly's Contract

The contractor for the new wharves on the west side of the harbor was not making satisfactory progress, but as the whole of this work has been completed verbally, and it has now been taken out of the contractor's hands and another contract is to be placed in the hands of the board of trade.

Length of New Piers on West Side. The new pier in course of construction at the West Side of the harbor, vary in length from about 750 feet to 800 feet, and the question has been raised as to whether it would be advantageous or otherwise to increase those lengths to say, 1,000 feet. It is not feasible to extend the outer end of the new piers further into the entrance channel, as any extension there would tend to cause a constriction not only to shipping passing further up the harbor, but also the volume of water passing through the harbor during the spring freshets. In my opinion it would likewise be a great mistake to lengthen them at the inner end, and thereby encroaching on the 400 feet strip of land, and so reducing facilities for exchange of traffic and storage capacity for sidings. Even if it were feasible to lengthen the pier to 1,000 feet, they would still be too short for two good size ships to come alongside.
