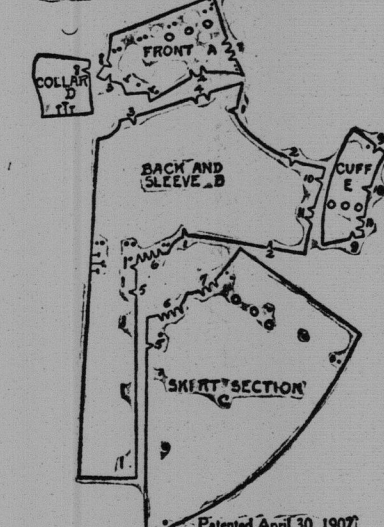
This seems to be the most stunning of the advance models in dress making. It is developed in mastic gray velvet, 5 yards 44 inches wide being required for the suit.

The lesson today deals principally with the coat illustrated. The skirt section is cut from an open fold of the material. The back and sleeve cut in one, are carefully arranged on a fold of the velvet. Other parts of the pattern are laid on a hemstitch thread.

Now, to make the coat, first place the upper edge of the front, placing "T" on small "oo" perforations.

Close sleeve seam as notched. Sew pleated edge of front to back as notched.

Germans Threaten Ostend
While The Allies Advance

London, Oct. 11.—The first official admission that the British participated in the defense of Antwerp is contained in an admiralty announcement, late Saturday, that three naval brigades with heavy guns, had been sent there during the last week of the German attack.

The announcement adds that in the retreat from Antwerp two of the British brigades reached Ostend safely. The other, however, was cut off to the north of Lokeren (a town in East Flanders, twelve miles northeast of Ghent) and 2,000 of the men were interned in Holland.

The retreat of the Belgian army was accomplished successfully.

The losses of the British naval brigades will probably be less than 300, out of a total of 8,000 men.

GERMANS ADVANCING ON OSTEND.

London, Oct. 11, 12.15 p.m.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from The Hague, dated Saturday, says that according to trustworthy information from Belgium, the Germans are advancing swiftly toward Ostend, with the object of making the king, queen and government officials of Belgium prisoners.

London, Oct. 12, 4.15 a.m.—Germany has imposed a fine of \$20,000,000 (\$100,000,000) on Antwerp as a war indemnity.

London, Oct. 11, 9.30 p.m.—With the conclusion of that phase of the war of the nations which came with the fall of Antwerp, the center of the European communication issued this afternoon deals only with the battle, or series of battles, which have been in progress for four weeks from east to west in France, with an ever-extending line, which now reaches northward from the elbow at Noyon to and across the Belgian border at Armentieres.

To remind Parisians that they are still in France, two German aeroplanes which seem to choose Sundays for their visits, flew over the French capital today. They dropped a score of bombs, which killed three persons and wounded twenty, but did no material damage to the city.

Hints for the Cook

Chowchow.

Two quarts small green tomatoes, twelve small cucumbers, three red peppers, one cauliflower, two bunches celery, one pint small onions, two quarts string beans, quarter pound mustard and two ounces tumeric, half ounce allspice, half ounce pepper, half ounce cloves, salt, one gallon vinegar. Prepare vegetables and

cut in small pieces, cover with salt, let stand twenty-four hours and drain. Heat vinegar and spices to boiling point, add vegetables and cook until soft.

Shredded Coconut Cake.

One cup sugar, quarter cup butter, whites of two eggs, 2-3 cups flour, 2-3 cup milk, one heaping teaspoon baking powder.

Filling—Yolks of two eggs, one cup milk, one large teaspoon cornstarch, ten small teaspoons sugar, half cup coconut in a little milk. Stir all together and cook like custard. Put between layers.

Watermelon Marmalade.

One watermelon, sugar, lemons. Cut the heart of ripe watermelon into small squares, minus seeds and strings. Allow two lemons and 8-4 lb. of sugar to each pound of fruit. Cut lemons in slices and cook sugar fruit and lemons together till the syrup thickens.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Cleansing with mustard is said to remove the smell of fish from pots.

If a knife is placed under a tumbler or glass dish, boiling milk or water can be put in without breaking the glass.

Rusty looking silk can be made clean and new looking if sponged with the water in which potatoes have been boiled.

When boiling eggs, wet the shells thoroughly in cold water before dropping in the boiling water and they will not crack.

After washing lamp chimneys, try polishing them with dry salt. This gives

the glass a brilliant shine and prevents it from cracking.

Fat or suet will keep sweet for a much longer time if separated from the skin, finely shredded and dry mixed with flour. Keep in a dry, cool place.

A good way of stiffening the bristles of hair brushes after washing is to dip them into a mixture of equal quantities of milk and water, and then dry before the fire.

To remove fruit stains from tablecloths and serviettes, apply powdered starch to the stained parts, and leave for several hours till all the discoloration has been absorbed by the starch.

Always put scrubbing brushes to dry with the bristles face downwards. This lengthens their lives considerably, as if dried the other way the water naturally soaks into the wood and rots the bristles.

To remove paper labels from old bottles easily, wet the face of the label with water and hold it for an instant over any convenient flame. The steam formed penetrates the label at once and softens the paste.
