



ANOTHER C. P. R. RUMOR

A report which cannot be confirmed, says that it is the intention of the C. P. R. to maintain its present fast service between Montreal and Halifax, over its own system, during the winter months. The flyer St. George, will probably be taken off the Digby-St. John route for overhauling and the curious are wondering what boat could be obtained to relieve her.

The company however, have many ships at its disposal—among them the Prince George, which is now at Philadelphia undergoing extensive repairs to her machinery. In the urban areas the numbers are for the most part below 20. The highest in an unurban area is 27.9 at Great Yarmouth.

The ratios are generally higher in the counties than in the boroughs and divisions of London, but there is one remarkable exception—namely, the county of Glamorgan, where the proportion of London as a whole is represented by

markable exception—namely, the county of Glamorgan, where the proportion is 9.9 per 1,000 of the population. In most of the extra-metropolitan administrative counties the number was over 20 per 1,000.
