LAURIER'S TOUR OF WEST IS ENDED

Valedictory Honors to Premier At Medicine Hat

SUMS UP RESULTS

Sir Wilfrid Joined by Lady Laurier and Return Trip to Ottawa is Begun—Hon. Mr. Graham Arranges for G.T.P. to Handle Wheat

Medicine Hat, Alta., Sept. 3.—(Special)—The tour of Sir Wilfrid Laurier which opened with mammoth meetings in Port Arthur and Fort William two months ago was brought to a conclusion with another great gathering here yesterday afternoon.

Premier Sums Up Tour

Sir Wilfrid summed up the experience of his tour as follows: "I left home, Canadian to the core, I return ten times more Canadian, I have imbibed the air, spirit, and enthusiasm of the west. I am proud to be a Canadian, and I should say 'Canada, for we must not forget to be a Canadian in each other. So I am returning home now. I have learned a great deal in the last two months. I have learned to know my country. On July 7, I set my face towards the setting sun; on September 3, I am setting my face towards the rising sun. Yet, whether rising or setting, the same sun is over all Canada."

Such experiences had been an intense satisfaction to the premier. The republic was learning that monarchical institutions here were not less democratic than those to the south. The King of England was subject to the law as the President of the American Republic, without so many antedecedents.

The statement of Hon. C. R. Mitchell, provincial minister of education, that Alberta had started upon a policy of paying teachers materially increased salaries, drew throughly equipped schools and granting liberal appropriations to all educational projects drew from Sir Wilfrid words of earnest commendation coupled with a note of warning to Eastern Canada.

Significant addresses were delivered on the occasion of the opening of the large new Alexandra school by the premier here. The children, with flags, paraded the streets and presented a beautiful bouquet to Lady Laurier, who joined the party this morning from St. John's.

G.T.P. to Handle Grain This Season

In an interview this morning Hon. Geo. Graham told your correspondent that arrangements had been completed by the government for handling of the grain shipments on the new Transcontinental from Winnipeg to St. Boniface over the Canadian Northern connection. This arrangement furnishes a complete through route to the elevators over the new railway for the present season. It means that the Grand Trunk Pacific will handle a lot of this season's grain crop.
