



MONTREAL BOASTS 50 MILLIONAIRES

Names and Chief Sources of Wealth of Men of Mighty Financial Resources in the Big Canadian

Winnipeg, Vancouver, etc., are progressing rapidly and adding to their wealth, the fact remains that Montreal is the largest and wealthiest of our Canadian citles. A variety of reasons contribute to this condition of affairs. The city is one of the oldest in the country, and, consequently, was given a start over other centres. It is the head of ocean navigation and the headquarters of two of our greatest transportation systems. These facts, with an abundance of cheap labor, make it a great manufacturing centre, as well has a great wholesale and distributing point.

As an indication of the wealth of the city, we have only to take recognition of the fact that there are in the city today at least fifty men who are in the millionaire while scores of others must be regarded as wealthy men, having resources of anything from a quarter of a million to of anything from a quarter of a million to firm the course of their wealth. 


