

SHOWS HELEN OF TROY WAS REAL

Manuscript in Tut's Tomb
Proves There was
Trojan War.

Chicago, May 6—Helen of Troy was a real girl. That's the discovery just announced that has been made from recent excavations in Egypt. Dr. James H. Breasted, head of the Oriental Language Department of the University, said so.

Dr. Breasted has just returned after a four months' stay in Egypt, where he has been deciphering manuscripts found in the tomb of Tut-ankh-amen. In the tomb are manuscripts that will fill out and amplify all the history of Egypt not known, he says, and also will throw a light on ancient Greek history.

An Apostle of Liberty.

For example, there have been found documents in the tomb to show the seriousness of Tut-ankh-amen's revolutionary belief in freedom of thought and individuality had on the politics of his time. They supplement the vague information regarding the frantic efforts of his girl widow to save her throne by an alliance with the Prince of the Hittites in Asia Minor.

It is in this ancient correspondence that Dr. Breasted has discovered documents supplementing recent discoveries in Asia Minor, showing that there was a Trojan war, and that Helen, the lady for whose sake ships were sunk and battles waged, was a real woman and not the figment of the imagination of a roving Greek minstrel.

"The tomb of Tut-ankh-amen," Dr. Breasted said, "is a treasure house of ancient art. It survived from a revolution which was the first period of spiritual emancipation in human history."

This revolution, he explains, was caused by Tut-ankh-amen and his father-in-law. They declared in favor of one God, caused their artist to draw pictures of the King in intimate and realistic pose and allowed freedom of thought.

Shocked Old Families.

All of this was for the first time in Egyptian history and shocked and horrified all the old first families of Egypt. The result, history shows, was that the throne was wrested from Tut-ankh-amen widow, and the old stand-pat regime resumed.

Dr. Breasted served as an informal mediator in the misunderstanding between Howard Carter, excavator, and the Egyptian government. In the capacity of head of the Oriental Institute, supported by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., he worked to make possible the uninterrupted progress of the study of the contents of the tomb.

"Saad Pasha Zaghlul, the Prime

Minister of the new and independent Egypt, expressed to me without reserve his purpose that the new Egyptian government should accord the fullest consideration to the claims of science in the administration of the priceless heritage of monumental remains for which he and his colleagues are now responsible, both to the people of Egypt and the world," Professor Breasted said.

CANADIAN VETERAN IN MEXICAN PRISON

Efforts Being Made to Have
Him Released From Hor-
rible Conditions

Winnipeg, May 5—Langusling in a Mexican prison in Vera Cruz, under conditions described as horrible, is a young Winnipeg former soldier, with a distinguished war record, condemned to serve a term of twenty years.

His name is Arthur Patrick Hellwell.

Mrs. A. Hellwell, the boy's mother, who resides in this city learned of his condition through the good offices of a kindly woman who saw young Hellwell on board ship, bound for prison.

According to Mrs. Jennie Ackerman, stewardess of the steamer "Monterey,"

a passenger boat running out of New York harbor. Hellwell was sentenced for having shot and killed a man at Tampico, Mexico. His plea was that of self-defence.

In her letter to the boy's mother, Mrs. Ackerman stated that Hellwell's plight evoked the sympathies of those on board. Despite his terrible fate he had remained uncommunicative and at first had been too proud to divulge his real identity in order that efforts might be made to secure his release. He is

known to his guards as "Jack Burnham."

Mrs. Ackerman warns Hellwell's mother that her son may be permitted to attempt escape after a year or two incarceration in order that some valid excuse be given the guards to shoot him down. This, she points out, is the Mexican way of avoiding the expense of keeping prisoners.

Negotiations have been opened with Hon. E. M. McDonald, Minister of National Defence, Ottawa, and an appeal has been immediately instituted to bring Hellwell back to Canada.

Veteran organizations are also lending their assistance in the matter, while the British consul and Governor of the State of Vera Cruz requesting their intervention.

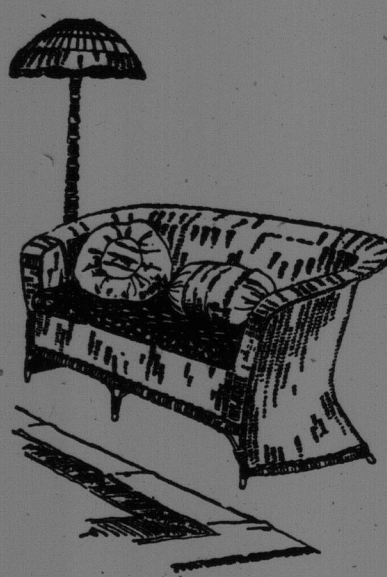

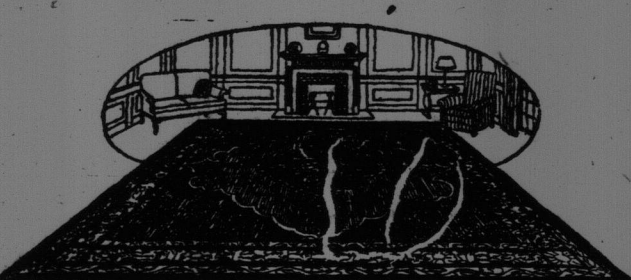
