GOLF.
Champion Outsted.
Muirfield, Scotland, June 10.—The pre-eminent feature of the third day's play in the British amateur golf championship yesterday was the elimination of J. L. C. Jenkins, holder of the championship title since 1914, by Bernard Wragge of Worthing in the fourth round. The match, which was stubbornly and keenly contested, went to an extra hole before the title-holder was defeated. They were all square after playing the home hole, but Jenkins failed to get his tee shot into the hole, giving Wragge an advantage of which he availed himself to win what he called the match and his right to the title.

Only two contestants from the United States remained in the running at the opening of the fourth round but at the conclusion of this lap, Robert A. Gardner of the Hinsdale Club, Chicago, was the sole survivor. Gardner was twice national title holder in the United States. Yesterday he defeated Jack MacIntyre of Cardross, four up and two to play.

The Deal Tournament.
London, June 10.—The drawing for the open golf championship at Deal were made here last night. There were professional and twenty-two amateur entries, which is only four less than for the open championship at the same place. The qualifying competitions will be played at Walton and Weybridge on June 23 and 24, the final round being on the Deal links on June 30 and July 1.

ATHLETICS.
A New Running Track.
A W. Covey, president of the maritime branch of the A. A. U. of C., made arrangements with civic authorities yesterday to put tracks and men at work filling in for a running track on the East End playgrounds. George N. Hatfield will set the grade stakes for the track and it is hoped to have it ready by next week. Jumping pits will also be made, standards erected and other facilities arranged for those who will enter the Olympic trials on June 26.

Some handsome prizes have been donated for each event. A solid gold medal goes to the winner of the fifteen mile race, and four silver medals to the next four men. A solid gold medal will be awarded the winner of each of the field and track events and a solid silver medal to the runner-up.

Amongst the local sprinters who will likely feature in the sports are: Bridges of U. N. B., George Margetts, a former star of Michigan University; Oxy McDonald of St. John's; Trimble of U. N. B., and Coster of Dalhousie. Coster and Trimble starred for their respective alma maters in the recent inter-collegiate track meet held in Moncton.

THE RING.
Lenares to Meet Brosseau.
Montreal Herald: Jules Lenares, sparing partner of Georges Carpentier, gave out a statement in Boston that he intends engaging in several bouts on the Atlantic coast. The Belgian champion also intimated that he was as good as matched with Eugene Brosseau, the Canadian, for a ten-rounder in Montreal in the fall and the bout may come off if Brosseau boxes again.

Tendler's Victory.
Milwaukee, June 10.—Lew Tendler of Philadelphia, was given the newspaper decision over Richie Mitchell of Milwaukee, in a ten-round no-decision bout

last night. Tendler showed to advantage in a majority of the rounds. Each boxer scored a knock down from stiff blows to the chin, Mitchell being upset in the first round and Tendler in the fifth. Mitchell lost considerable blood from a badly cut lip in the fourth. Georges Carpentier, French champion, boxed an exhibition bout with his Belgian sparring partner.

Britisher Defeated.
London, June 9.—Ted "Kid" Lewis defeated Johnny Basham, British welterweight champion in a fight for the welterweight championship of Europe last night. Basham was badly punished. His seconds threw up the sponge at the end of the ninth round.

The Dempsey Case.
San Francisco, June 9.—Testimony of Mrs. Maxine Dempsey, former wife of Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion pugilist, in regard to confidential communications between them while they were married, was ruled out at his trial here today on charges of evading the draft. Defense counsel declared the court ruling precisely barred the champion's former wife from testifying. Prosecution attorneys said they would endeavor to call her to testify. The prosecution contended that she was not Dempsey's wife when his question was made out, although it said he was supporting her. Dempsey's attorneys contended she was his wife, and as such could not testify against him. The court ruled out prosecution evidence intended to show she had not obtained a final decree of divorce from George Grashoff, Salt Lake City, when was married to Dempsey.

THE TURF.
Montreal Trainer Coming.
C. R. Polvin, the well-known Montreal trainer, will campaign on the maritime and Maine circuit this season. His stable will consist of nine horses, one of which is said to be Budlight, 2004, formerly in Murphy's stable and not obtained a final decree of divorce from George Grashoff, Salt Lake City, when was married to Dempsey.

SHAMROCK IV. Tuning Up.
Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock IV, challenger for the cup in the international yacht races, was given a tuning up spin yesterday under heavy weather canvas. Weather conditions were not ideal for such a test as there was only a light breeze. However, she sailed along in a surprising manner.

Yale-Harvard Regatta.
Gales Ferry, Conn., June 10.—Agreement on the programme for the Yale-Harvard regatta on June 25 was reached last night by the Yale and Harvard rowing officials. The varsity race over the four mile course is scheduled to be rowed up stream at 5 p. m. standard time. In case it is delayed past 5.30 p. m., the race will be rowed down stream after seven p. m. standard time.

Legless Wins in Swimming.
Washington, June 10.—Robert S. Fletcher, a soldier who went to war from Plain View, Tex., is at Walter Reed Hospital, with both legs amputated at the trunk. In a swimming and diving contest at the hospital pool Fletcher won the high honors. He will return to Texas and run a ranch after he leaves the hospital.

SIDELIGHTS ON SPORT

Considerable interest is being manifested in a baseball game to be played here on Saturday afternoon between Marysville and St. Peter's. The former team is leading the York County League with four straight wins to its credit, and the St. Peter's nine are leading in the city league with three wins and no losses. Both teams will have their strongest line-up and a good game is anticipated.

Moncton papers are announcing an exhibition match between Mike McGuire, champion middleweight of Canada, and Arnold of Halifax. Arrangements were made to have Frankie Burns of this city meet McGuire, and he was training hard for the encounter. The bout is to be held in the railway town on June 29, 30 and July 1. Why the change is a mystery to local followers of the game. Burns is a clever and aggressive boxer and would have made McGuire stop some other to defeat or outpoint him. Burns has had a hint of experience in the ring and has an enviable record in the west.

Abnormal hitting in the American League is puzzling lie fans and it is attributed to the ball, which is said to be truer than that used in the National League. Manufacturers of the American League ball insist that it is the same in quality that has been produced for the last twenty years. To date American League teams have made 100 home runs, and only fifty-eight have been made in the older organization. Unless there is a stop put to the terrific hitting, it is a safe bet that pitchers will again be allowed to come across with their freak deliveries. To rob a pitcher of some pet ball is killing his effectiveness and will not tend to make the game as interesting.

It is evident that McGraw is out to strengthen his club when he trades Art Fletcher, his field captain, for Bancroft. The Giants may yet be in the pennant fight.
