Toronto, July 30.—The annual convention of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance was opened yesterday in Association Hall.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Shutt, and F. S. Spence, secretary of the Alliance, moved that Rev. Mr. Carson, Montreal, be appointed recording secretary. This was agreed upon.

G. presented the report of the Executive Committee, submitting the following recommendations: That a resolution be adopted calling upon the friends of temperance throughout the province to unite in an earnest effort to win a decisive victory in the voting on December 11.

Referring to the deep obligation of the army to the colonies the writer said no requests of his had ever been refused by the colonial Governments, and their consideration and generosity fully equalled the character and quality of the troops they sent to South Africa or raised in that country.

Almost all the leading generals were commended, including the writer's brother, General Fred Kitchener, who was described as an exceptional, keen and energetic officer.




