Elections

We would not mind it so much if some attention was paid to the outport citizens' appeal for, as it happened last winter, coal, and for hospital accommodation, and in the case of Bay Roberts, the present need for seating accommodation for the public building.

But these requests find the authorities with both eyes blind and both ears deaf.

Quite a number of people use the water from this well for drinking purposes, as it is very fine. Labrador Fishery Closed

The Labrador fishery is now, practically speaking, over. The Reid Newfoundland Coy. had a message from Capt. Parsons, of the Sagone, saying she had reached her final port of call on the 18th inst. (Monday). She reports that the fishery is pretty well closed and that all the crews are now getting ready to leave the coast for home.

Will take 18,000 Qtls.

The S.S. Haraldskaug, 10 days out from Cardiff in ballast, arrived at St. John's Wednesday morning. She will take 18,000 qtls. fish in casks to Alicante and Naples and shipped by the Fish Shipping Coy. She is loading at A. J. Harvey & Co.

Goes to the Poor House

An old and worn out fisherman of Carbonear, who in his younger days was a successful fish killer but lost his life's savings some years ago through some unscrupulous investments that he was led into, was forced to seek admission to the Poor Asylum recently. The poor old man whose age is ten years beyond the allotted span, feels his position keenly. It is said that some of his immediate relatives are well to do, but refused to offer assistance.

We wish to call the attention of those in authority to the conduct of some boys who congregate nightly at the Cross Roads. Their rowdyism, coupled with their profane and indecent language, is very annoying to the residents and passers by.

Induction Service

The Induction of Rev. A. B. S. Stirling as Rector of the Parish of Bay Roberts took place on Friday, the 15th inst., at 7.30 p.m. in St. Matthew's Church.

There was first a shortened Evensong. The prayers were said by Rev. Hollands, while Revs. Hunt and Higgett read the first and second Lessons, respectively.

The Rural Dean had read the Bishop's License giving the Rector authority to officiate in the Parish, the usual declaration was made by the Rector. The Rural Dean then delivered into his hands—according to the prescribed and impressive form—the key of the church and a bible. The Rector was now conducted to a seat in the sanctuary.

The Rural Dean's address on Authority was listened to with rapid attention by all present. The reverend gentleman traced the institution of authority by the creator, and pointed out that with out submission to lawful authority, either in Church or State, there must inevitably ensue chaos and disorder.

The service throughout was inspiring, and must have made a deep impression on those who attended.

Canning Fruit Without Sugar

In these days of high prices, with sugar foremost on the aviation list, many housewives have taken serious thought as to the advisability of putting up less fruit than usual.

This is a pity, because home canned fruit is not only safe and sure, but most delicious. It need not be as rich as preserves, in fact, epicures regard fruit as refreshing in exact proportion to the smallness of the amount of sugar used to preserve.

Fruit for use in pie or salads or as stewed fruit can be put up or canned without the use of any sugar at all. The canning specialists of the Canadian Department of Agriculture advise the housewives who, in order to economize on sugar, have been thinking of reducing the amount of fruit they put up, to can as much of their surplus as possible by the use of boiling water when sugar syrup is beyond their means.

Any fruit, say the specialists, may be successfully sterilized and retained in the pack by simply adding boiling water instead of the hot syrup.

The use of sugar, of course, is desirable in the canning of all kinds of fruits and makes a better and ready-sweetened product. Moreover, most of the fruits when canned in water alone do not retain their natural flavor, texture and color as well as fruit put up in syrup. Fruit canned with out sugar to be used for sauces or desserts must be sweetened.

Can the product the same day it is picked. Cull, stem or seed, and clean the fruit by placing it in a strainer and pouring water over it until it is clean.

Place the containers in a sterilizing vat, such as a wash boiler with false bottom; or other receptacle improvised for the purpose. If using a hot water bath outfit, process for thirty minutes; count time after the water has reached the boiling point; the water must cover the highest jar in can sinner.

After sterilizing remove packs, seal glass jars, wrap in paper to prevent bleaching and store in a dry, cool place.

War News

Germans Penetrate Russian-Roumanian Line

Berlin, Sept. 19.—The new line taken by reinforced Russian and Roumanian troops between the Danubs and the Black Sea, have been penetrated at several points by Teuton's forces, the War Office announced today.

Rumanian official

Bucharest, Sept. 20.—Rumanian official war communication issued today says:—On north and north-western front there were skirmishes of slight importance along the whole line except in the valley of the Streun River where the enemy attacked violently with superior forces and where we fell back slightly. On the southern front along the Danube there has been an exchange of gunfire. In Dobrudja region on Sunday night the enemy attacked towards Ennin, southwest of Kobadin and were twice beaten back, and fighting continues.

Conscription Suggested for Ireland

London, Sept. 20.—The application of conscription in Ireland is suggested by the Daily Mail today in an article calling attention to the urgent necessity for obtaining more men for the army. Besides this problem, which, it says, has engaged the full attention of the Government, the newspaper suggests two other methods for adding to the army, namely: Raising the age limit from 41 to 45 years and calling out young men from exempted occupations. It estimates there are 1,250,000 physically fit who have not yet been drafted into the army.

Various War Reports

London, Sept. 20.—Altho there is a pause in the violent infantry fighting in the Somme region in France, due to the inclement weather, heavy battles are in progress on the eastern front in Russian Galicia, Transylvania, Rumania and on the southern front in Macedonia.

Along the Stokhod River in Russia, the Germans and Austro-Hungarians have taken the offensive against the Russians according to Berlin, and have crossed the river in pursuit of their retreating foe, capturing 31 officers, 2,511 men, and 17 machine guns. Here four lines of Russian trenches were penetrated by the Teuton's Allies, says Vienna.

In Galicia counter attacks by forces of the Central Powers along the Youks River southeast of Lemberg, brought further successes to their arms, and resulted in the capture of an additional 4,200 prisoners.

In Ludwa region in the Carpathians, the Russians have gained new positions and are fighting among the snow clad peaks.

The war chancellors at Berlin, Sofia and Vienna report victories for Teuton's Allies over the Rumanians in Transylvania and Dobrudja. In southern Transylvania near Hatabrg according to Berlin the invading Rumanians have been repulsed and are being pursued by the Austro-Germans, while in Dobrudja the new line formed by the Russians and Rumanians south of Constantza railway and running from the Black Sea to the Danube, has been penetrated at several points and villages captured.

In France and Belgium there has been violent artillery activity in Somme and Verdun sectors and around Dixmude. A local German attack against the British trenches east of Matinpuich, north of the Somme, was repulsed. Berlin admits the relinquishment to the Entente forces trenches in Ghinchy and near Combes which had been previously demolished by the Entente artillery.

Infantry fighting between the Italians and Austrians on the Carso highlands has noticeably diminished, altho the artillery of both sides continues active. A report, attributed to a reliable diplomatic source from Athens is to the effect that the Austrians are preparing to evacuate Trieste.

Latest War News

Canada's Somme Losses

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—The military department is informed that Canadian losses on the Somme number about four hundred killed, 1200 wounded, and 300 missing. There are no official details.

Anzacs, Good Work

London, Sept. 21.—The Germans launched heavy counter attacks last night on British positions south of the Ancre on the Somme front, the War Office announced this afternoon. New Zealanders, defending the attacked positions, beat back the Germans with severe loss to them.

Serbs Great Feat

Athens, Sept. 21.—Greek military officers regard the recapture of the Karmakacala plateau by the Russo-Serbian troops as the most important military event in the Balkan campaign up to the present. The height, which is 7,800 feet above the level of the sea, lies in Serbian territory, and constitutes the western door post to Siberian Macedonia. Local Serbs are jubilant over its capture, which they consider rivals the mountain feats of the Italians.

Generally regarded as a modern disease, appendicitis was known in Egypt 5,000 years ago, and accurately described in still existing records.

The Government has issued an appeal to the Russian subjects resident in the United Kingdom to enlist in the British army on the same conditions as Englishmen. Naturalization will be granted after three months of service.


