Found Dead

The body of the man which was found near the railway track at Clark's Beach last Friday night has been identified as that of James Muford, a fisherman, of Sandy Cove, Port de Grave.

Mr. Muford, so we learn, was returning from the Labrador in a sick condition. He landed from the steamer at Hr. Grace and bought his ticket for Clark's Beach. He was brought beyond Clark's Beach to Hueville station. Getting off there he started out to return. Feeling rather weak he visited a house and obtained a cup of tea. Leaving the house he started off to look for a taxman to drive him home, and while doing so he died from exhaustion.

An investigation into the circumstances of the poor man's death is being conducted by Magistrate Thompson at Brigus this week. The conductor of the train and the train crew, relieving officer Gosse and others are being examined.

Westminster Gazette on Voluntary Recruiting

London, Aug. 23.—The Westminster Gazette, while reiterating its preference for voluntary recruiting says the most serious argument which can be brought forward on the question is the necessity, at this stage of the conflict, for making some public demonstration of the firmness of this country's intentions, in order to reassure the other nations with which we are allied. The Westminster Gazette thinks that any doubts on this point could be settled by a declaration from the Government that it was raising an army of minimum forces to be defined by a certain number of troops, and that in order to ensure the reaching of the complement stated, every means, including compulsory service, if necessary, would be exerted.

Ship is Sunk and Captain Killed

London, August 24.—Pursued for four hours by a German submarine, the freighter Diemed, of the Lamport & Holt Line, was finally sunk yesterday after her crew had been rescued by shells fired by the submarine. The disaster occurred near the entrance to St. George's Channel.

Japs. to Help Russia

Amsterdam, Aug. 30.—Japan's decision to assist Russia by increasing her output of war munitions has been announced officially to Petrograd, The Telegraph says. Japan has notified Russia she is preparing to mobilize her entire industrial resources for this purpose.

Good macaroni is of a yellowish

tint, does not break readily in cooking and swells to three or four times its bulk.

If boiled, frosting has been cooked too long, it may be rendered smooth again by adding a piece of butter the size of a walnut before beating it.

Only the yellow rind and juice of lemons should be used. The white pith under the yellow is bitter and care should be taken not to use it at all, especially in cookery.

If you stage a chicken by holding it over the chafing dish, you can do the task thoroughly and have no spot on the skin of the fowl.

After boiling salt beef leave two or three cooked carrots in the liquor until cold. The carrots will absorb the salt and liquor can be used for soup.

Sometimes boot polish becomes quite dry with keeping. Moistened with a little turpentine. It softens the polish, making it usable at once and also gives a good gloss to the leather.

Winnipeg, Sept. 1.—Sir Rodmond Roblin, J. N. Howden, Dr. Monaghan and G. R. Caldwell, will appear before Police Magistrate Mc Donald tomorrow morning charged with conspiracy to defraud the Province. It is expected they will be remanded. The four ex-ministers voluntarily appeared at the city Police Station and were released on bail of \$50,000 each.

Decline in Exchange

New York, Sept. 1.—The trend of the money market, which the country leaves to the world, for the first time was imperilled today by the alarming drop in foreign exchange rates, notably sterling. At the close of business tonight the English pound fetched a but \$4.55 1/2 in American money. A deputation of British bankers will soon reach New York on a mission to straighten the money market.

However he is relentless in his endeavors to mitigate the horrors of the conflict and bring about a situation where efforts on behalf of peace will be likely to have some chances of success.

Royal Wavillon, Aldershot Camp. Lieut. Colonel R. de B. Burton, Commanding.

The Newfoundland Regiment. "Before the Regiment leaves for Active Service to-night I wish to send my heartfelt wishes to you and all ranks. I have had the most anxious accounts of the work done by the Regiment since its arrival in England and from my personal observation of the Guard of Honour furnished to me on my arrival at Aldershot, I have little doubt that the Regiment will give a good account of itself in the face of the enemy. Good-bye and Godspeed!"

Attention to Mouth and Teeth

Too much attention cannot be paid to mouth and teeth. On May 28th the 800,000 children of the public schools of New York City bought tooth brushes for the first celebration of Tooth Brush Day. The entire week was Hygiene Week, and devoted to the scrubbing of teeth and dental hygiene.

As 3 o'clock all the children were taught what first aid to the teeth meant, and the serious result of neglecting them. This was done by trained specialists, prominent dentists of the city, 150 of whom volunteered to aid the Board of Education. They spoke for an hour in the schools.

Friday, Tooth Brush Day, saw drills in every school immediately after the opening of the afternoon session. The actual demonstration was done in each class by a leader. The class leader had in addition to his or her tooth brush a cup of water; and the drill went as follows:—

"One, two, three, four, brush the front teeth with a rotary motion. Dip. One, two, three, four, brush teeth at the side with the same motion. Dip."

The leader had real water in her cup, but the children made believe, and with their brushes went through the "one, two, three, four, dip," following each motion of the leader.

A field day of dental hygiene brought the week to a close, with tooth brush drills in Central Park, Prospect Park, Van Cortlandt Park and the Bronx. The school children in the contest, which was run by the Department of Physical Training of the Board of Education, C. Ward Crampton, Director, competed for banners.

Thus, these 800,000 children spread the gospel of mouth cleanliness in that many homes and to five million people.

Letter From Volunteer Bradbury

Badsjos Barracks, Aldershot, Aug. 13, 1915.

(Editor the Guardian).

Dear Sir,—I suppose you would like to hear how we are enjoying ourselves on this side of the water. As we hear that we are leaving for the Dardanelles in the near future, we are hoping to have the same luck there as we have had during the time since we enlisted.

Yesterday we were inspected by Lord Kitchener. He said to us, "You men of Newfoundland, you are not only a credit to your Island but to us all, and I am more than glad to see the way in which you have come up to the standard." There were over twenty thousand soldiers standing on our parade ground, and as many civilians. They were, I believe, uncountable. It is good times with us all the way along, and we believe that when it comes to us to use the steel we will show them the kind of stuff we are made of. One thing, sir, I can tell you, that every one of us are longing for the time to come when we will be able to do our part.

We are now training in the best military base that England has got, and I think we have got enough of training now to manage the Turks. We received our orders this morning to be ready in 14 days' time, so you know that we will soon get our chance. Now, sir, all of our boys are feeling good. I had the preference of being taken from E Company and transferred to A Co., also Robert Butler. Although we didn't enlist as soon as A Company we will be to the front as quick. Now I have to finish and go on parade. Hoping to be able to come back again and see old Bay Roberts again, and wishing the town prosperity and good luck, I will close. Hoping to hear from you and wishing you as happy times as we are having. I remain, sir, your obedient servant, A. K. BRADBURY, 1st Nfld. Regiment.
