TRIP OVER GULF SHORE RAILWAY. EXTENSION OF THE LINE TO THE LAZARETTES. BATHURST, June 25.—Thos. D. Adams, Esq., of the Gulf Shore Railway Co., invited a number of ladies and gentlemen of the county to take a trip to-day over the Carleton and Gulf Shore Railway to Tracadie. The party left here at 11 a.m., arriving at Tracadie at 2 p.m., a distance of 71 miles, making some short stops along the line.
