The work of the home has been carried on during the year in a very efficient manner.

On July 1st, 1902, there were in the home 18 patients. During the year just ended there have been admitted 10, viz., 5 males and 5 females. Seven have died, 3 males and 4 females, leaving now in the home 21 patients, of whom 7 are males.

During the year 12 regular monthly meetings of the board have been held, also three special meetings and five meetings of the executive.

Miss Betts, our invaluable matron, and the nurses under her have faithfully discharged their duties and in so, doing have added materially to the comfort of the suffering ones committed to their care.

To the medical staff our warm thanks are due for their services, the gratuities have ever been willingly and efficiently discharged. To the kind offices of the woman's aid we are largely indebted. Through their instrumentality the Sunday services are cared for, a preacher provided and musicians procured. At the festivals of Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas these ladies and their friends do much to bring to the inmates of the home seasonable joys. Nor is the beneficence confined to great occasions. Every week brings a visit from at least one of them, a visit never perfunctory and clearly prompted only by love and friendly interest. The board feels list hands strensthened by the constant support of the ladies and their unwavering adh neve to the true spirit of the work.

POPE MAY LIVE FOR DAYS

Condition Today Unchanged, But Doctors Say End Is Not Far Away.

ROME, July 15.—11.05 a. m.—Dr. Lapponi left the vattcan this morning to pay another visit to his daughter, who is suffering from a fever. He said in reply to enquiries that the pope might linger some days.
The following medical bulletin has been issued:
"During the night the pope had several hours rest. His pulsation is 82, respiration 30, temperature 36.2 centigrade. There has been no noticeable change in the general condition of the august patient.

Do not abandon me," The delirium ceased entirely at four o'clock p. m., when His Holiness again revived. Having eaten nothing throughout the day, he was then given four spoonfuls of meat broth and masticated some beef without swallowing it. From midnight up to five o'clock this morning, the pontiff was constantly drowsy.
