TOGO ROYALLY WELCOMED HOME.

The Japanese Honor Him and Admiral Kamimura. Capture of Rihlung Fort Was a Bloody Affair—Defenders Were Nearly All Killed.

AN IMPORTANT CAPTURE.

TOKIO, Dec. 30, 10 a. m.—The headquarters of the army besieging Port Arthur, telegraphs that on the night of Dec. 29, after the occupation of Rihlung Fort, a small body of Russians still offered resistance in the passage between the siege gun line and the gorge. At their headquarters they were dislodged entirely and the occupation of the fort became secured.

HEROES WELCOMED.

TOKIO, Dec. 30, 11 a. m.—Admiral Togo and Vice-Admiral Kamimura, with their staff, arrived at the Shinjuku station at 8:30 o'clock today. Their journey from Kure to Tokyo was a continuous ovation. At an early hour today the streets were filled and the city gaily decorated with flags, lanterns and New Year's decorations.

As Admiral Togo appeared a great shout arose, hats were thrown in the air, arms were raised and "Banzai" followed. "Banzai" was repeated by the army and the navy department, where a brief stop was made during which the congratulatory of the ministers were received and future victories were toasted.

JAPS FIGHT EACH OTHER.

CHE FOO, Dec. 29.—The Japanese line at Port Arthur is now, as a result of the general attack, beginning Dec. 28, much closer to Liaotie Mountain. Chinese who left Port Arthur yesterday and arrived here today report that a greatly inferior Russian force defended the outermost of the trenches for three days, retiring when the Japanese artillery had secured an enfilading position.

TOWN HELD FOR RANSOM.

MOROCCO BANDITS Demand Mercy or the Surrender of European Residents of Beseleg Town.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—A Tangle, Morocco, despatch to the Herald says: "The town of Akesar is again menaced by a large number of mountaineers, belonging to the Kabyles. They are the same tribesmen who recently besieged the town, following a dispute between a Moor and a Spaniard. They were then induced to raise the siege by the payment of a generous bribe. The money then paid has merely aroused their greed. They have now returned, demanding the payment of a still larger sum. In the event that this is not forthcoming, they demand that certain of the European residents be surrendered to them. It is generally believed that the town will have to accede to their demands, as it is poorly prepared for defence.

BIG FIRE ON SEWELL ST.; TWO HOUSES GUTTED; FIRE BADLY HANDLED.

A bad fire broke out in the residence of M. V. Paddock, the druggist, Sewell street, shortly before one o'clock today. The fire originated in the kitchen of Geo. E. Fairweather, adjoining. An alarm was sent in from box 4 and the department promptly responded.

Mr. Fairweather has \$3,000 insurance in the Hartford. About three o'clock the flames had been subdued and half an hour later the fire was out. Though promptly responding to a call from box 4, the firemen seemingly did not at the outset effectively place a check upon the flames, which had then made only small progress.

As a result of the fire which broke out shortly before one o'clock in a small shed adjoining the residence of M. V. Paddock, 67 Sewell street, the residences of both Mr. Paddock and George E. Fairweather, 63 Sewell street, adjoining each other, are badly gutted. The residence of Mr. Fairweather was damaged the worst, as the fire went through the roof, but both buildings, each three stories, will require extensive repairs to make them again inhabitable.
