While Returning Home From Visit to Scotland.

Had Been III All the Way Across-He Was One of St. John's Oldest

In 1896 the business was incorporated under the name of the White Candy Company. In 1899 Mr. White retired from active participation in the business, which is now conducted by his sons.

In 1857 Mr. White married Miss Charlotte E. Armstrong, daughter of the late John Armstrong. On January the first of this year Mr. and Mrs. White celebrated the golden anniversary of their wedding. Besides his widow the following children survive:

Thomas F., manager of the White Candy Co.; Leslie, who is now in Westein Canada; William, with the Flood Co.; Frank, proprietor of the King street confectionery store and restaurant; Harry D., employed as bookkeeper in the King street store and Frederick E., in Montreal, He is also survived by six grandchildren.
