

POLICE IN REVOLVER

MONTREAL, Sept. 2.—A revolver duel took place today between Montreal detectives and four suspicious characters near St. Constant, who are supposed to be the robbers who broke into the St. Eustache bank. St. Constant is on the south side of the St. Lawrence directly from Caughnawaga, on the Canadian Pacific Railway. St. Eustache, where the bank robbery took place, is on the mainland, about fifteen miles directly north of the Island of Montreal.

When the four men were discovered Detectives Posie, Samson and Brosseau decided to intercept them. They separated and Detective Pusie got the closest. Three of the men started off and the detective made a grab for the last one. Just as he did so the man drew a revolver and aimed it full in the face of Pusie. The weapon was held so close that Pusie was blinded for a few moments, but he managed to use his own revolver and succeeded in wounding the tramp burglar in the arm. He then made off with his pals.

It was first thought that Pusie had been shot in the head, but upon closer examination it was seen that his face bore no more dangerous marks than the powder charge, the bullet just missed him.


